Cathy was born in Church Village, near Pontypridd, with a Welsh speaking father and grandmother. She learnt Welsh at school and took it at 'O'level, and today she says she still understands it but has little reason to speak it.

In true Welsh musical tradition Cathy learnt violin and piano up to top grades. and became a member of Glamorgan County Youth Orchestra. Glamorgan was one of the pioneers of county youth orchestras and Cathy benefited from the experience before moving on, at the age of fourteen, to the Welsh National Youth Orchestra. She spent her summer holidays, after a residential ten days training, touring Wales giving concerts. It was very hard work, but great fun, with a built in social life. In 1966 they did an exchange with a Slovakian Youth Orchestra in Bratislava, when Alexander Dubcek was in power, just before the 'Prague Spring'. (For those too young to remember, Dubcek initiated some reforms to the Communist hard line, which were eventually quelled by the invasion of Czechoslovakia in August 1968, without bloodshed, as Dubcek ordered the army not to respond). It was her first visit abroad and they stayed in a holiday camp surrounded by barbed wire and (empty) sentry boxes, the people were very poor and the shops had nothing much to sell. Cathy remembers the date for a second reason, because their charter plane (which flew from Filton) came in to land over the very new Severn Bridge.

After school she went to Cardiff University to do a music degree. She chose Cardiff because it was a practical course offering a wide variety of opportunities to play. It was at this time that Cathy fell in love with the mellow sound of the viola and started to play it at music societies and concerts. After Cardiff she went on the Guildhall School of Music to do a postgraduate year, an entirely practical course, playing the viola. During her year there she was chosen to play on a 'Youth and Music' course in Lisbon, one of the Robert Mayer series. She also played at one of the Lord Mayor's Banquets for people in the Arts, in the Guildhall in London.

After the Guildhall School of Music Cathy came to Bristol to join the BBC Training Orchestra. Sadly this no longer exists, but it was invaluable for newly qualified musicians to spend up to three years learning the repertoire in the orchestra and being coached by top professionals, before they embarked on their own careers. She then went to the Halle Orchestra in Manchester as a viola player, but after a short time she left to return to Bristol and freelanced for two years with many orchestras, including the Bournemouth and WNO. She rather enjoyed this, as there was so much variety and there was no need to get involved with the politics of any particular orchestra, as you were always on the fringes.

In 1973 she was working temporarily with the BBC Midland Radio Orchestra in Birmingham, but after she married her husband Chris that year, she moved to the BBC Orchestra in Cardiff full time, travelling daily from Bristol where they lived. After their son Tim was born she became freelance again and two years

later Matthew was born, so she has been freelance ever since, either teaching privately or playing the viola. Career highlights include BBC orchestral tours to Japan and Germany and many appearances at the Proms.

They lived in an old cottage in Bristol, but always wanted to move to the country, so they explored all round Gloucestershire, and settled on Olveston. Nothing came up through the estate agents, but when someone put a note through their door, they decided to do the same in Olveston, and that is how they came to live in the Old Meeting House on The Green. A big and very welcome surprise came when they saw inside the house. The Quaker Meeting Room at the back of the house is a perfect room for music, having a high ceiling and furnished with plenty of wood.

Soon after they moved here, they joined the Twinning Association and went on the trip to Brehan. It was a wonderful way to meet not only new French friends but also new Olveston friends. Cathy is still very involved in the musical world, including playing chamber music in The Meeting Room.

Chris and Cathy have always loved travel, especially to exotic locations. Tim being in the travel business has been a great help, and now Chris is retired they have even more time. They have been to Peru, Namibia and India amongst others, and in November they are travelling to Bhutan. If, like me, you don't know where it is you will need an atlas!

ROAD CLOSED!

There used to be a saying that you could wait forever for your bus to arrive but when it did three more would follow close behind. It seems a little bit like that around Olveston this summer with roadworks in the area stacking up.

First the closure of Haw Lane early in July. Although intended for only three weeks the likelihood is that could well be for longer. Olveston Parish Council has long complained that the retaining wall by the wood was unsafe and remedial work was needed to improve it and finally South Gloucestershire Council agreed.

Almost at once it was also announced that Vicarage Lane would have to close for five days to allow essential maintenance on a house, requiring scaffolding well into the road.

The 'third bus' to come along stopped at the The Green where Wessex Water need to dig up the road to carry out sewage pipework and this work too, off and on, could take some time.

The 'last bus' to arrive in our procession was destined for The Street, Olveston. The Parish Council has pushed hard to have this dreadful piece of road resurfaced and finally, thanks to support from Councillor Matthew Riddle, South Glos have agreed to the work being done.

However the downside could be that four of the roads in and out of Olveston could be out of commission at once this summer. Nevertheless such inconvenience does at least offer the consolation of improvements to our daily lives in the long run.

Police Report for June

In June there were 13 reported crimes, Aust services had 3 'making off without payment' incidents. The History of Aust

This is a report from a talk which Eric Garrett gave to Alveston Local History Society in April 2007. I thought newcomers to the Aust area would be interested. Ed

It is 40 years since Aust hit the headlines when the First Severn Bridge opened, but there is a lot more to this village than that splendid structure!

There has been a Severn crossing near Aust for at least 2000 years. Roman records show a river crossing here (Trajectus) with a boat ferry used by legions and their families en route to Caerleon in Gwent. It was also the place where Edward I crossed to meet with Llewellyn, Prince of Wales. centuries, drovers brought huge herds of cattle over the river to markets at Thornbury, Bristol, and elsewhere. Aust village was in the Domesday Book of 1086. For centuries, loaded packhorses, wagons, and eventually Mail coaches made their way over the rough roads to the Aust ferry. The Turnpike Acts of 1798 improved roads and speeded up traffic on the main routes; tolls were collected at Turnpike Cottage. 1827 saw the inauguration of a steam boat service which ran from the new stone jetty built in 1826. Sadly there were several tragedies resulting in loss of life, and this led to the closing down of the ferry service in 1855, but it was reopened in 1924 by Enoch Williams, and later operated as a successful car ferry from 1931 until 1966. At one time there was a 2 hour service, 6 days a week. By 1966 this had become a 20 minute service operating 7 days a week dependent on tides and requiring widened access roads and improved ferry buildings with a café and waiting room.

The 2,500 acres of the Aust village estate were valuable. Much of the area was originally marshland; the Romans built a sea-wall, and the Saxons drained the area producing good agricultural land. On rare occasions the sea defences were breached, with devastating effects – the last time was in 1910. Whilst northern England was being over-run by Norsemen, the South West had a Christian King, Ethelred, who granted the Aust and Henbury estates to the Bishop of Worcester, whose ownership continued until the Dissolution. Indeed, the Pope made Augustine Bishop of the entire South-West; he held a great church conference at Aust in 997 which was commemorated in 1997.

At the Dissolution, the estate went to Ralph Sadlier. Reclaimed land was soon enclosed by major landowners. such as the Duke of Buckingham who took 334 acres for Thornbury Deer Park and Castle grounds. In 1662 the Aust estate was purchased by Samuel Astry of Henbury, a rich landowner married to an heiress. The couple disinherited their two "intemperate and vicious" sons. Their three daughters married well, (into the Howards, the Smythes of Ashton Court and the Chestermasters of Knole Park, Almondsbury) and each inherited a third of the Aust estate, - with £20 to pay a priest to hold services in Aust Church. Subsequent changes in ownership mostly involved relatives and

descendants of the three sisters until finally the Sitwells divided and sold the estate in the 19thC. Aust manor plus the title and Cote Farm were sold for a massive £32,000 to Lippincott. Other properties came into the hands of the Cann-Lippincott family.

A church ('Chapelry') existed here in the 12thC, but the current building dates from the 14thC. Rev'd John Wycliffe, translator of the Bible, served in Aust at one time. The "Chapelry" was at first attached to Henbury Parish, then joined to Northwick - and finally attached to Olveston in 1950. Named "St John's" in the 1920's, it has been the venue for mass funerals for ferry victims, and survived bombing in 1943, and an all-out strike of the congregation in 1924! There are gravestones and memorials to local families - and in Henbury Church an unusual plaque to Scipio Africanus, a Negro servant with connections to Aust Manor. Hill House, opposite the Church, is the site of the old Manor House.

Of seven pubs once in the village area, only the ancient Boar's Head remains. Extra hospitality for ferry passengers was supplied by the 'Esperanza' and Cliff House Tea-Gardens, and of course the Passage Hotel. There was a village shop/post-office/petrol supplier once run by a Mr Kingscott. The Infants School, established in 1878, catered for 30 children - older ones walked to Northwick school via the safe and direct "horse way" path (with its rolling banks). The Zion Methodist Church, built in 1896, still stands.

And last but not least - the shoreline at Aust is famous for its rock strata and fossils, including prehistoric reptiles, many displayed at Manor Farm. Ancient relics included a rare bronze Romano British figure now in the British Museum, which is portrayed in the logo of Thornbury Heritage Group. A remarkable and fascinating history for such a small village!



Thornbury Choral Society

The Choir is very eager to welcome new singers. So, if you sing at school or you used to sing at school or college and would like to take it up again or if you have just always had a yen to sing, why not come and have a go for a few rehearsals.

Our first rehearsal is on Monday $3^{\rm th}$ September at 7.45 pm. at the United Reformed Church in Thornbury.

We give two concerts in a year and a Workshop in the Spring. This session we are singing some quite different works: Benjamin Britten's "St. Nicholas" which features three boy trebles and is really tuneful and Kurt Weill's "Happy End" which will have you tapping your feet. We do hope you will come along to try us out.

1st Olveston Scout Group:

In June's Meeting Point there was an appeal from Ian Knowles for new Leaders. The following article by Amanda Williams is about what Scout Leaders actually do. The Group Scout Leader's role sounds rather daunting so I hope it doesn't put anyone off coming forward. ed

The Group consists of Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. There are leaders and assistant leaders of each section and a committee (usually of parents, but any member of the community can be involved). The Group Scout Leader (GSL) oversees what is happening throughout the group and liaises between the group and the district.

In my role as Group Scout Leader:

- I make sure every adult who is involved with the children or money has a CRB (Criminal Record Bureau) clearance. Often the leaders or members of the committee give these out but I check them and send them off to District.
- I make sure parents or carers fill in a Tax Aid form so the group can claim the basic rate of tax back from the tax man.
- I interview every potential leader to make sure they know what's involved and are clear on the Scouting system and what will be required of them (and the potential benefits and enjoyment!).
- I keep records of the leaders' training and ensure they keep up with what they need.
- I ensure each leader knows about and follows the rules for the activities they undertake.
- I go the District meetings (every 2 months) and ensure our leaders' views are represented and then make sure the leaders know what are the thoughts and events the District are involved in.
- I go to Group committee meetings (again, every 2 months or so) and put forward the thoughts of the leaders and the District and then report back.
- I hold leaders' meetings about 3 times a year to ensure each section knows what's happening and we discuss where the group as a whole is going and what we need out of the committee.

Very little of the work needs to be done on one particular night so I often work in the evenings or days which suit me and e-mail people at strange times of the day and night.

How much involvement a GSL has with the young people is optional. As my boys have progressed through the sections, I have been involved with hikes and camps at Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. As a leader there is training for the role which needs to be done as soon as possible as it is so useful. One of the delights of being a Scout Leader is the variety of courses on offer: there are training sessions for just about any activity you enjoy and other people who are enthusiastic and willing to share expertise with each other.

A section leader eg a Scout Leader has a far more 'hands on' role.

A leader must be CRB cleared and have an interview with a District appointments' committee to ensure they are suitable and that they know what they're getting into! Saying that, the Scouts have no discrimination on gender, religion, race etc.

The leader has training for the job, where they meet other leaders and find out more about their responsibilities and the back up that's available.

Again, there are courses to teach any activity you're interested in and to share your enthusiasm with others.

The leader must meet with the other adults in the section (and for Scouts, with the older children) and plan a balanced programme for the coming term. As many activities need permission and planning to meet Scouting requirements of health and safety, the planning needs to be done in plenty of time.

Then it's the role of the leader to ensure that each meeting is run safely and with enjoyment for all the young people in the section. That's all!!!

Summary

High pressure built at the start of the month centred on Southern Norway and, apart from a rain shower on the 1st, the next thirteen days were dry, warm and sunny. All changed on the 14th when a low pressure system was trapped to the South West of Ireland between high pressure over the mid Atlantic and high pressure over Southern Europe. This low pressure system moved extremely slowly Eastwards over the next twelve days and continually swung its frontal systems over the country bringing heavy rain, wind and cool conditions. June is known as the "European monsoon month" because low pressure systems are often trapped, as above, or a succession of Atlantic lows pass over the country causing significant rainfall. How this month earned its nickname of "Flaming June" is a mystery! Torrential rain occurred on the 25th with extensive flooding in many parts of the country. The spell of unsettled weather continued to the end of the month.

Rainfall for the month was approximately double the normal level and for the first six months of the year rainfall has been about five inches above average. Barometric pressure was well below normal but temperatures were close to average. We had one electric storm in the month.

This was the wettest June since 1998!



PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE on OPEN SPACES

The latest plans were described to the Annual Parochial Meeting at the end of April. As you probably know they include better functional facilities provided in a visually pleasing and practical way. We plan to have new toilets, storage, kitchen, meeting room, changing areas for

priests and choir and worship facilities such as an improved small worship space and new audio visual equipment, all within the building.

Except that things do, and sometimes we feel aggrieved at not being 'in the know'; it's not that we're unduly inquisitive, necessarily, but we don't like being left out (except when we choose not to be bothered, etc. with all the terrible things that happen in the global village, or even the terrible titbits in our own village). So I guarantee it won't be long before you hear somebody say "Nobody told me! How was I to know?", and the mild (through gritted teeth) reply: "It was in the pew sheet / Meeting Point / the Gazette", only to be met in turn with: "I must have been away", which is understandable, or "Oh, I can't be bothered reading that", which is bordering on the inexcusable.

We have a duty to be in the know, those of us who are Christians, and to ensure that others are, too, when it comes to what's going on in and around our churches, and, too, in and around our village. That's not a licence for gossip. The trick is to do so without appearing unduly 'nosey', though I'd rather people were nosey than allow, as I also heard tell recently, someone to be lying injured and in agony on their kitchen floor for three days.

Getting the balance right, getting our priorities right, needs constant practice, and some of us want to add, as an article of faith, constant prayer too. When Jesus was asked about getting our priorities right, he said "Love God,and love your neighbour"; when someone asked prissily "who is my neighbour" he told the graphic story of the good Samaritan to explain how far neighbourliness should go. A good start for some of us would be to get to know (all over again, if needed) quite who our neighbours are!
