Village People Norma and Keith of Old Down Hill

Norma Richards was born on a snowy December Sunday in Almondsbury Hospital; when her mother Laura woke up from the anaesthetic, the church bells were ringing and at first she was unsure whether she was still here on earth or had gone to heaven! The family lived at Hillcrest, Old Down Hill, where Norma and Keith live today.

It was a simple, happy childhood for Norma, her sister and brother. Water was drawn from a pump for washing and drinking water was fetched from a standpipe near the road. Light was provided by oil lamps and the earth closet was outside. The cottage was only two up and two down originally and, while Norma's father worked in the quarry, her mother brought up three children, while caring for her own blind mother and also her brother, who lived in a chalet in the garden recovering from TB.

Norma went to school at Westons at the top of Old Down Hill before she was five and was collected each day by Governess Durnell who lived at The Limes in Tockington. She then went to Olveston School, where she passed the 11+ exam for Thornbury Grammar School. On that momentous day she was allowed home, after borrowing a bike, to tell her mother. Her mother sent her round to see Mrs Pursey next door in Yew Trees Cottage, who rewarded Norma with a half a crown (12½p in today's currency)!

Electricity and running water came to Old Down Hill in the 1950s. By then Norma had left school after a year in the Commercial Form dedicated to shorthand typing and book keeping. She went to work at the Bristol Aeroplane Company as secretary to the Apprentice Manager. Keith was an apprentice and organised a Jazz Evening, while playing trumpet in a Jazz band at the social Club, so they met in their teens through a mutual love of jazz. When they were married, they bought a caravan at Woodlands Park before saving up for a house in Thornbury, where their sons Nigel and Julian were born, returning to Hillcrest in 1973.

Keith was an apprentice in the Machine and Fitting shops, but took advantage of the part-time release schemes, initially to attend what is now known as Filton College, and then to Bristol College of Science and Technology to gain his Higher National Diploma in Mechanical Engineering (degree level today). He worked in the technical staff departments and moved up the ranks to obtain his Professional qualifications CEng and MIMechE. For three years, he was departmental head of the In-Service Development of Concorde's engines until future development was stopped in 1985. (Concorde was finally cancelled in 1991). He then moved on to be Operations Manager for the Development Group and finally took early retirement in 1991.

Meanwhile Norma had worked at Trinity Theological College, until she gave up to nurse her mother Laura for five years before she died in 1984. Norma then worked for a few years in Southmead Hospital and Hortham Hospital. During this time she was churchwarden at St Mary's Olveston; typed Meeting Point for many years before it was computerised; was secretary to the Parish Players for a long time;

W.I minute secretary for years; and assisted Keith who was wedding secretary for the church, when she and Keith interviewed prospective married couples.

Keith was treasurer of the Angling Club at Littleton for eighteen years; a member of Thornbury Art Club and has taught water colour painting classes for the U3A for ten years. For three years Keith painted the scenery for Parish Players productions, then every year since he and Norma have done the props and Keith has helped with the scenery. They are both members of Thornbury Ramblers and Keith is a member of Probus.

Thus they are both having a very productive retirement and they wanted me to mention how they love their succession of very well fed cats! Life on Old Down Hill generally flows peacefully but I will finish with the Great Garage Fire of 1991!

In the middle of the night our dog Cider woke us up (we live next door at Yew Trees Cottage) barking frantically. On investigation, we found one of the cars in their garage (built by Keith) ablaze. A quick call to 999 was followed by trying to wake them up. By the time the fire engine came from Patchway the firemen could see the blaze from the top of Almondsbury Hill, as the second car was by then burning merrily. A second fire engine came from Thornbury and the fire was soon under control. Then the Thornbury fire engine, presumably without the hand brake on, slid slowly down the hill and into the other fire engine, which was rendered undriveable. As bystanders we were horrified by the blaze but to the firemen it was a routine event, and the crashing fire engines were rather amusing to us, but certainly not to the firemen! Norma and Keith said it was like a combination of 'London's Burning' and 'Dad's Army'!



The dramatic content of the storyline and vibrant character roles give great acting opportunities to the cast and should be a tonic for Spring audiences.

Our Parish Matters

After such a miserable few months we might have hoped that autumn would bring the consolation of an Indian summer. Though it came, it only lasted about 3 days before more miserable weather descended, including sleet and inches of hail. Unsurprisingly some of our footpaths are consequently not in the best of condition.

However Peter Cabban, Olveston Parish Footpaths Warden, tells us that stile-replacement is under way locally and some are being changed for kissing-gates to

aid the less nimble. The Tockington to Olveston footpath is rather the worse for wear at present but it is hoped that it will be brought back to standard soon. Where other paths have become overgrown, it seems that this stems from under-use. Perhaps the advice is "use 'em or lose 'em". Peter is pleased to announce that publication of a new Parish Footpaths Booklet may soon be complete.

A number of pavements and footpaths in the residential parts of Olveston are becoming increasingly difficult to use, as hedgerows and garden frontages have become overgrown. We are hoping that this message will prompt residents to inspect their own areas to see if they can improve things for the rest of us. Where the Council bears any responsibility for work, we intend to see that action is taken too.

Sadly, October has brought the sad news of the passing of one of the Parish's most valued, and perhaps unsung, members. Roly Jackson was a man who served the Parish in very many ways over a lifetime spent living here. He was born in November 1928 and lived his early years at Ingst although he later became a resident of Olveston. This ex-Rolls Royce employee retired early at 55, leaving him with plenty of time to express the love he felt for the Parish by becoming involved in the running of so much that has gone on here.

He had a keen interest in sport, especially football, cricket and in later years, golf. He showed an interest in Parish Hall business, in providing a local youth club, and was a member of the Sports and Social Club at Old Down. Indeed, as a Parish Councillor during the 80s and 90s, he oversaw first the building of an extension and later the rebuilding of the remainder of the Pavilion at Old Down, which was completed in 2001. It was largely due to his efforts in acquiring grants for these projects that work there was possible. Our present Chairman June Lyons remembers him well as a dedicated member of the Parish Council who regularly volunteered to organise the Budget for the Annual Precept. He served on all the sub-committees, including the one that liaised over the building of the second Severn Crossing. He later went on to become a District Councillor but he always remembered the interests of the Parish that he loved. He was a man who always listened to the views of parishioners and dealt with problems with discretion and integrity.

He was a keen gardener too and held an allotment on the edge of the village. In his later years Roly also sat on the Parochial Church Council and will be remembered as a true servant of the Parish he so cherished and which now cherishes his memory. We send our sincere condolences to his family.

Roly would undoubtedly have been pleased to see the resurgence of the Parish Hall, including the reinstatement of the Annual Harvest Supper - a huge success.

Now, as the wind howls and dark nights prevail, we can at least look forward to the celebrations to come in December. To that end the Parish Council wishes all its parishioners a very happy Christmas and a New Year full of hope and success.





News Around - Severn Vale Art Trail.

We are delighted to say that the Severn Vale Art Trail is to go ahead again in 2009 between the 2nd and the 10th of May. The trail extends from Almondsbury to Berkeley on either side of the A38. It will be preceded by a "Showcase Exhibition" in Thornbury Town Hall during the Thornbury Arts Festival week, which runs from 17th to the 26th of April, and will display examples of the Artists' work.

A wide range of Arts and Crafts is to be found on the Trail. Work by local Artists includes painting, sculpture, batik, textiles, basket weaving, pottery, stained glass and jewellery. Watch out for the colour brochure to be widely distributed. Copies will be available nearer the time from the Town Hall and your local shops, pubs and restaurants. TIPS

Christmas is fast approaching, so it's a good opportunity to capture the spirit of celebration by photographing the Christmas lights; this can also apply to other celebrations such as carnivals, fairs, and festivals.

Lights always show up best at night, and seasonal snow or reflections from wet surfaces can enhance your composition; use a wide angle lens to capture more Christmas lights. Consider taking shots at twilight, especially if there is interesting foreground; the extra light from the moon can provide more detail without spoiling the night scene. If you want a sharp image and aim to capture both the Christmas lights and their surroundings you must use a tripod, as you will need an exposure of several seconds, and it's impossible to hand hold your camera that long. Alternatively, a half second exposure for hand held photographs might produce some interesting light trails while keeping your original subject recognizable.

At Christmas, the most important thing, the most blessed thing, is to *receive*. Receive the Christchild into our lives, take on board his message of God's love for us and of peace to all mankind. That's a gift worth waiting for, and remembering!
