

Stone Circle Memories



My parents and I were bombed out of Bristol in about 1940 and, having lived with my godparents in Thornbury from 1940 to 1944 (by which time I should think everyone was pretty fed up with each other) my parents rented Cross House in Tockington when I was about 6 years old. We occupied about half of the big old house, formerly one of

Tockington's pubs, facing The Green and just opposite the Cross Circle. My father was in the AFS (Auxiliary Fire Service) and served through the Bristol Blitz, so had a phone on a tall stand; a car, CYC 265, with the fuel needed to get him into town. I was later told there were only 6 cars in the village at that time.

My friends and I were free to roam up onto Little Down, where there were butterflies on huge ant hills in the long grass of the headland; up onto the Park above Tockington Manor where the 'swinging trees' were, and down around the bottom of the village where we climbed under the bridge over the stream from Sheepcombe Valley which flows under the road. Most fields had cattle and a pond in which newts could be hunted.

I would be sent off up Oldown Hill to school of a morning, alone as I recall, in my boots with 'Blakeys' in them to protect the soles from wear, since soles and boots were in short supply. Oldown Infant School was a single huge room like a church and our teacher was Miss Durnell who, it was rumoured, could sit on her hair.

Around The Green, with no traffic (would you believe), we had road races on our bicycles. I tried to beat a 2-wheeler on my tricycle and had a terrible crash at Pool Corner, removing the skin from my knees and I think scaring my mother with rather a lot of blood. At the centre of The Green was the bleached skeleton of the Cross Tree on its massive stone circle, which we jumped off, beginning at the top end which was low and gradually moving around to the low end which was as high as me. When we tired of that, we practised jumping off backwards, but I never had the courage to jump off the very highest bit.

Mon 6th Apr at 7.30pm: A fun, modern-day murder mystery drama where everyone is a suspect in the style of an Agatha Christie whodunit. When a rich author is found dead from what is first believed to be suicide, a private detective is enlisted to investigate. From the author's dysfunctional family to his devoted staff, the detective sifts through a web of red herrings and self-serving lies to uncover the truth behind the untimely death. Mon 20th Apr at 7.30pm: Based on the thrilling and inspirational life of an iconic American freedom fighter, the film tells the extraordinary tale of a woman's escape from slavery and transformation into one of America's greatest heroes. Her courage, ingenuity, and tenacity freed hundreds of slaves and changed the course of history. The film serves as a sincere tribute to a pivotal figure in America's story of abolition. *(2019, 2h 5m, Cert 12)*.

All the films are shown in St Mary's Church, Olveston and doors open 30 minutes before the start. Refreshments are available at all the shows, plus

licensed bar in the evenings and popcorn and soft drinks at any morning films.

South Pacific

It would be a crime if some of Rodgers and Hammerstein's finest songs and arrangements were sacrificed on the altar of political correctness. In fact, 'South Pacific' is a little historical and musical masterpiece. Set in a far-flung world in the turmoil of war, the warmth and success of the piece are derived from its prevailing sound moral messages: the championing of bravery and love 'sans frontières' and a light touch of criticism at the lack of understanding between different races brought together through conflict. However, above all, 'South Pacific' is joyous and superbly crafted entertainment, and the Parish Players are good at this! Highly experienced director Linda Evans made the most of every comic, romantic and thought-provoking moment. Her casts are always well-disciplined, slick and committed to their roles.



The chorus provided really excellent singing, both in parts and solo passages, the younger members of the team showing a great deal of promise. In fact, the show opened with two such young actors (Sophie Allsopp-Jones and Nathanael Moss), singing and acting with real confidence.

The whole plot revolves around a love story (or two!). The suave free-thinking Frenchman, Emile de Becque, played with sincerity and emotion by David Proud, falls for small town American Ensign, Nellie Forbush, played by Sarah

Wiggins. Her superb skills in acting, singing and dancing combined with real warmth make her performance an utter joy and inspiration to those around her. How lucky are we to enjoy that kind of talent in tiny Tockington!

We also, of course, enjoyed very professional design and technology. Costume (Cath Chappel) was both authentic and sensitively chosen. The vast numbers of scene changes were most efficiently handled by the sharp backstage team and Andy Black's practical, yet suitably exotic, set design. With some lovely artistic lighting and sensitive sound effects, the difficult job of transporting us to Bali Ha'i was well-achieved. And Lesley Clarke, as Bloody Mary, did a fine job of creating Bali Ha'i too, in her magical rendition of the famous number.

Bloody Mary weaves magic to lure a young GI to her daughter, Liat, delicately played by Amy Sunderland. Lt Joseph Cable (Paul Harrod), who genuinely falls for her charms, captured the decent young American most ably with real stage presence and, when confident, showed promise in his singing.

The gang of other GIs was led by fine singer, Paul Dimery (as Luther Billis), whose sense of comedy provoked some real laughter, not just when dressed in grass skirt, wig and coconut shells as Honey Bun, but in all those rumbustious scenes with the other guys. They all really supported him well in voice and visuals. Their superior officers (John Jones and Ray Hale) also had a real handle on the comic and serious moments. The chorus of girls worked just as hard, becoming nurses, nuns, or secretaries with equal panache and a lovely sense of fun.

Every musical number is a winner in this, one of Rodgers and Hammerstein's greatest shows. Musical Director Chloe Allsopp-Jones and her team yet again provided expert, spirited and sensitive support for the cast. Our heartstrings were pulled, and our feet set tapping, almost to the point of joining in, with the imaginative choreography from Jill Harris.

Seeing the Parish Players always has a feel-good factor, especially when the world is more or less set to rights amidst some romance, fun, and glorious, glorious music. Use it. Don't lose it!

At our February meeting we had an interesting talk by Hugh Price, a volunteer member of Avon and Somerset Search and Rescue. The team works in conjunction with the emergency services in a missing person situation. Many searches have taken place in the Cheddar and Avon Gorges, involving rock climbing in hazardous environments. Fast running water is another dangerous element they have faced on other occasions. The team members must be very fit, and continuous training in the various situations ensures that they are kept as safe as possible. The sobering result of searches is that many of their victims are no longer alive, suicide, mental illness and dementia being contributory factors. Hugh told us that knowing that they are helping families in their time of distress, together with the camaraderie of working with the team and the emergency services, spurs the members on to volunteer in this unending but rewarding work.

A group of members visited Oakham Treasures at Portbury in February. Oakham is an interesting museum of memorabilia from the 20th century. A real 'blast from the past' for members, most of us grew up with many of the exhibits!! We followed this with a very pleasant lunch at the museum café.

'The Glorious Uncertainty - Salmon Fishing in the River

Severn' was written by local resident and ex-Marlwood teacher Nick Large, and is jam packed with over 120 photographs.

Nick started recording this local industry in the mid-1960s, not knowing that he was documenting the end of 1,000 years of history. The decline of the industry accelerated during the time that Nick was investigating it. In June 2019, the Environment Agency placed a prohibition order on taking any salmon from the Severn, such has been the deterioration of stocks.

On Wed. 1st April, Olveston Parish Historical Society is very pleased to welcome museum volunteers Meg Wise and Tony Cherry to Olveston. They will talk about how Nick was persuaded, over a period of three years, to turn his copious research (including countless interviews with Severn fishermen on both sides of the river) into a book. They will explain how, when Nick very sadly and unexpectedly died in December 2018, just before finishing the book, they took on the job of completing the work.

It was an enormous task, but it has all been worth it. The book is stunning. Nick was a brilliant photographer and he wrote in a most engaging style. This is local history at its best and serves as a fitting tribute to its author. Copies will be on sale for £20.

As an added bonus, we are delighted also to welcome Christabelle Tymko, who worked her father's ranks of salmon putchers at Oldbury-on-Severn, when he went off to war. Come and join us for a very fishy evening!

CATS is coming to Olveston CANCELLED

Come and hear all about CATS at the Olveston Methodist Hall on Wednesday 22nd April at 7.30pm. CATS (Climate Action Thornbury and Surroundings) is a part of Sustainable Thornbury and was formed in response to the October 2018 report of the IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change) which told the world of the need to become Carbon Neutral within just a few years if we are to ward off the worst impacts of climate change.

We in CATS believe it should be possible for Thornbury and all the surrounding areas to become carbon neutral by 2030 if we act now. All of us will have a part to play, as individuals and as associates of the companies we work for, the institutions we study at and the clubs and societies we participate in. CATS is starting to work with local government, businesses, community groups and other organisations to develop projects that will contribute to a

carbon neutral future. Projects will enable reductions in carbon emissions and also increased biodiversity of wildlife.

Meanwhile we are currently holding monthly educational meetings open to the public (optional £1.00 donation for room hire) on climate solution issues. They will usually be at the Chantry in Thornbury but in April we will be out and about with meetings in Alveston (St Helen's Church on Monday the 20th) and Olveston (Olveston Methodist Hall on Wednesday the 22nd.) Both meetings will start at 7.30pm. We will tell people what CATS is trying to achieve and find out how we can fit in with initiatives already going on in the villages. If you can't make the meeting for your village, you will be very welcome to turn up at the other one.

In May we will back in Thornbury on Monday 11th for another themed evening, probably on waste and recycling. Previous themed meetings have been held on local biodiversity and how the local councils work. Before getting married they spent time in New Zealand with Allison's family and in fact became engaged in Queenstown while they were there. They 'ran away' to St Ives to get married secretly but invited family and friends to a big garden party a week later in The Old Forge, where they were then living. Their son George was born in 1997 and he is the fifth generation of the family to go to Olveston School.



Calvin started a building business locally in 2004 which has expanded through word of mouth. In 2011 he started building their new home in the garden of The Old Forge part time, while still working for others. Applefields was ready to move into by December 2013, and today is a beautiful house. Calvin's interest lies in wood, either up cycling or creating small pieces of furniture, bowls and ornaments. He particularly loves collecting and renovating antique carpentry tools.

Fleeting glimpses of major cities in a whistle -stop tour can leave the experience of one city much like another. To discover a city's true beauty and charm, it is not enough to simply follow the crowd or the guidebook. You have to step off the beaten track and explore the humble side streets and out-of-the-way places to discover its true spirit.

To witness the crucifixion as a stranger and a visitor to Jerusalem, you would only have had to follow the crowds heading for Golgotha. A public execution was very much a form of entertainment. The evidence for Jesus' death was brutal, public, unavoidable His resurrection, however, takes place in the quiet and in the dead of night, far from public gaze.

Perhaps the women, the first witnesses to the resurrection, who went to the tomb, did not quite know what they were looking for. To find the resurrection they had to search for it. The resurrection is not an event that can be witnessed at second hand. When the women had seen their risen Lord, they could not convince their friends. The disciples must go and see. They must go themselves and look.

It can be tempting for us to avoid looking for the resurrection. We can continue to be focused in on our own failures and weaknesses and forget that Christ came to lift us out of these and to bring us, no matter what life might throw at us, a sense of peace and joy. There is an innate desire to blend in with the crowd. It can give us a feeling of security even though we may only be half alive. But if we are prepared to look and to search, we will discover what we are truly looking for. When we witness so much suffering, we do not always know where to look for the signs of hope – just as the women at the tomb did not know what they would find.

The light in the darkness will be revealed to us by God if we are prepared to search for it. The crowd may not notice. Our friends may be unbelieving or take some persuading. But when we open ourselves up to God in the midst of confusion and pain, we **will** meet the Risen Jesus. And that will change us forever. A Happy and Holy Easter to all.
