Village People -Nikki and Noel Clarke

Nikki and Noel met in Worcester when they were eighteen and doing A levels at the Technical College. Nikki considered doing her degree in London, but London felt too big and she came to the art college at Bower Ashton, part of the University of the West of England but apart from it socially and geographically. She studied one of the first degree courses in graphic design. Previously it was regarded as a craft and you would have been apprenticed to a newspaper or a printer. She immediately felt at home in Bristol and found the three years there very happy and inspirational; there was a strong feeling of an artistic community with much discussion with the other disciplines, fine art, ceramics and fashion.

After she graduated they married and moved to a village near Swindon because of Noel's job, and Nikki started with a design agency. But they always intended to return to Bristol, which they achieved when Noel's job was transferred. In the 1980s there was a complete change in the graphics world, as in everything, owing to the increased use of computers. Previously traditional production methods were used, such as typography in hot metal and art work on boards, but this was the time of the newspaper riots at Wapping and subsequent revolution in newspaper production and graphics generally. Noel and Nikki realised they could work together, Nikki doing the creative graphics and Noel, leaving the financial world, to do the computer production. Their business began in Bristol with offices just off Park Street.

When their children Holly and Lewis were still very young, Nikki remembered her country childhood and ignoring city friends who said it wouldn't work, they moved to Olveston - on Fun Run Day! Nikki knew they had done the right thing on Holly's first day at Olveston Primary School. Holly was joining midterm and on her first day there was a group of children from her class waiting to welcome her at the gate.

They have now been in the village twenty years and six years ago built a studio next to their house to work from, so no more commuting to offices in Bristol. This has had the added benefit that their London-based clients are more than happy to visit them as they really appreciate a trip to the country and in particular they like the lunches Noel and Nikki provide using locally sourced produce.

Their business has gradually moved away from design for print and into the more specialist area of design for packaging. They now have a broad client base from local to national companies. A lot of you will know some of their work as they seem to produce ALL the raffle tickets, posters and hand-outs for our local charities. But, little did you know that the packaging for the Lyons coffee brand and Frobishers juices was created here in Olveston!

A by-product of the design process is comparative shopping 'comp. shopping'. Before they begin a design project Nikki has to go out and buy a pack of every

similar product for comparison. This has become something of a legend in their house and the children became used to the phrase 'yes, you can eat it but keep the packaging!'.

With the children growing up and now at Marlwood Nikki felt she was losing touch with the village, and working from home had become rather inward looking. As she is a people person, she was delighted to be asked to join the Play 2000 committee who were fund-raising for new equipment for the play area in Olveston. Here she met some great people and made many friends.

When that was finished three years later and Holly and Lewis had gone to University, the empty nest syndrome kicked in, and Nikki knew she had to do something else. So, when the local Beaver pack closed through lack of support, Nikki put her name forward, always expecting that a more qualified candidate would appear! With enormous help and support from a Beaver leader from Thornbury and a great team of assistant leaders that she 'press-ganged' into joining her, she now has more than enough contact with people. She says that she has met *the* most generous group of people through Scouting and the training and support has been useful for both running the Beaver group and in her day to day job. Scouting is thriving in the parish and there are waiting lists for all groups. Nikki says it's brilliant fun - the children make her laugh so much and she would recommend it to anyone.

New Swimming Pool Complex opening in Tockington



Tockington Manor School has been fortunate enough to receive a grant from Sport England to enable them to build a state-of-the-art changing room complex alongside their indoor swimming pool. This was assisted by the Amateur Swimming Association and Thornbury Swimming Club, who already have an active role within the pool with their members swimming almost every day.

The swimming pool was originally built as an open-air 22 yard pool but with the foresight of Headmaster, Richard Tovey and the governing body, together with help from parents, Old Tockingtonians, Friends of Tockington Manor School and a lot of hard fundraising the pool was transformed in 2007 to a superb indoor 25 metre four lane pool.

The new changing rooms were officially opened on 8th May 2009 by Kate Grey, Paralympic gold medallist. The day was supported by parents, staff, Old Boys and Girls, Friends of Tockington Manor School and by members of Thornbury Swimming Club and the Amateur Swimming Association. Pupils from the school were all involved in a sponsored swim which was the distance of Dover to Calais! There was also a Water Polo display with coaching by our local club, Bristol Central. This was enjoyed immensely by the pupils who were able to play a Water Polo match in front of a cheering crowd.

The school now has the opportunity to open the swimming pool to the surrounding community. There will be an annual membership package available to families and adults with swimming slots most mornings, afternoons and some evenings with a family swim on Sunday mornings. Are you interested and would you like to know more?

This is a fantastic chance to support a local facility and at the same time enjoy a wonderful new sporting venture within the community.

Police Report for June

Hello, firstly I want to make you aware of an increase in what we term as "distraction burglary" across the South Gloucestershire district. Although the Severn beat hasn't suffered from any of these types of crimes in the last month it is very worthwhile making people aware. Distraction burglary is a particularly horrible offence, the offenders trick their way into the victim's homes (usually elderly victims) by saying they've got to turn the water off or check the water pressure or similar excuse. They can also tout for business door-to-door selling things or offering building/gardening work.

Very often they work in pairs or more, and while one offender keeps the victim busy the other(s) search the house for items/money to steal. If you have a person stating they are from the water board or other service **please please** check their identity thoroughly and I would recommend that if you're not expecting (by appointment) any tradesmen. then phone their company or phone the police on 0845 4567000.

As for the Severn beat it's been a good month. The only anti-social behaviour call was in relation to some youngsters camping out at Old Down. There were 39 calls to the police and 7 reported crimes.

02/06 Vehicles parked overnight in the Severn Maintenance compound had diesel stolen from them.

04/06 Woodhouse Scout Park had some equipment damaged at the top of the abseiling tower.

06/06 A mobile phone was stolen from a house in Olveston, where quite a number of youngsters were gathered together.

13/06 Again Woodhouse Scout Park had some damage where a stone was thrown through a tent.

13/06 A hanging basket was stolen from a house in Tockington.

21/06 A hole was cut in a fence at the rear of a house in Old Down.

24/06 A gate to a field was sawn through in Kington.

The vexed question of planning permission has come up at the Council recently. It appears that some people in our area, over the past year or so, have obtained planning permission only to exceed their remit and to take liberties with the limits stipulated. It should be noted that some time in the near future a check-up of any identified properties will be made, possibly leading to painful conclusions.

Finally, ending on a positive note, let's hope that our wonderful start to the summer can continue throughout so that we can all enjoy it in a summer to remember.

Weather Record April to June 2009

April

This was a fairly typical spring month with periods of relatively dry weather interspersed with three spells of rain continuing for a few days. In addition the temperature was very variable with many warm and cold nights and equally warm and chilly days. The first week was sunshine and showers followed by the first spell of rain. Sunshine and showers returned followed by rain again. A brief dry spell followed by a return to rain by day and cold nights persisted to the month's end.

Average temperature for the month was marginally above norm but average pressure and rainfall were somewhat below those expected for the time of year. We had one electrical storm and one gale in the month.

May

The mixed conditions of the end of April persisted until 11th May, when a prolonged period of eleven days was characterised by a succession of Atlantic low pressure systems passing over us bringing wet and windy weather. The end of the month brought a return to dry sunny weather with hot days and warm nights.



Rainfall for the month was barely above half the long term average. Sunshine levels were well above average and pressure was high too, but average temperature was marginally below norm.

June

The first week of the month was warm and sunny with cool nights. Following this we had an unsettled spell with rain and on the 11th a short electrical storm. The

remainder of the month was hot with only sporadic bursts of rain, with the last three days of the month being very hot and with extremely high humidity.

Rainfall for the month was close to norm as were average temperature and pressure.

Sunshine levels for the month were well above average.

TIPS

You may be out and about this August at rock concerts, music festivals, country fairs, parades, and other events. There are usually many photo opportunities, with a lot of colour, involving participants and their audience, so give event photography a go.

You'll want to take photographs that embody the theme of the event, the venue and setting, the acts and their fans.

Advance planning can help you get the best shots; consider the artificial lighting at a rock concert and the natural light at a civil war enactment. Try and obtain a schedule of events, off a website, decide what you wish to photograph and look at the location in advance for the best photographic positions, including high vantage points and down low.

Take a wide-angle lens to capture overall scenes and medium shots and avoid bright sunlight which can cause glare. The late afternoon through sunset is a great time for more dramatic natural light.

You will need a telephoto lens to shoot action shots on a stage; for rock and music concerts the stage lighting should provide illumination that suits the mood of the performance, though you may have to use "fill in light" in a post image editing programme to sort out murky shadows.

You will need to control depth of field and set your camera on aperture priority to get event participants sharp and the background a little blurred.

Above all have fun with your camera.


Next job was to build our shelters; oh did I mention we had no tents, Bivouacs organic and fresh. We were allowed to cut down some trees, one of our leaders is married to the farmer, she said he didn't mind. Next we had to light our fires to cook our tea, mackerel and jacket potatoes were on the menu. Stuart used fungus and a fire starter to create fire - Ray Mears eat your heart out! We had fire. Rob, an old scout, came with a fresh rabbit and showed us how to gut and skin it. Sam nearly fainted; he's not good with blood. Their job is to support the skeleton - importantly, the spine and the joints such as shoulders, pelvis and knees. When they don't do the job properly, we often experience pain and loss of mobility. The natural muscles are vital in supporting the spine and it is often the lack of function in these muscles that leads to debilitating back pain.

By working from the inside out, waking up and strengthening the deep postural muscles - the unseen muscles that hold us together - we create a strong and flexible body able to meet the demands of daily life. Pilates is infinitely adaptable and suitable for everyone whatever level of mobility - the seriously fit athlete, those who suffer back pain or joint problems, or for pregnancy rehabilitation following childbirth.

I begin by teaching the fundamentals of Pilates - good posture, correct breathing, and sound ways of moving. The exercises start very simply and become progressively more challenging as the body becomes stronger and you develop long lean muscle and greater flexibility. The benefits are measurable and visible; as Joe said, "after 10 sessions you'll feel the difference, in 20 sessions you'll see the difference, and in 30 sessions you'll have a different body".

So who would do Pilates?

Yours Faithfully The Price of Love

Usually Monday mornings on my way to work I pass no 15 Monk Road, Bishopston. On the wall is a blue plaque stating that Paul Dirac lived there for the first 20 years of his life. He later became a celebrated mathematician and Physicist at Cambridge University and in 1933 received a Nobel Prize for Physics for his work on Quantum Mechanics. One of his achievements was the discovery of antimatter which scientists have since been able to create in the laboratory. When matter and antimatter meet they annihilate each other releasing a vast amount of energy, but before anyone gets too worried about this, there is apparently far more matter in the universe than antimatter and it would take scientists a very long time at great expense to create enough antimatter to produce even a very small bomb.

It strikes me that human conceptions often depend on contrasts, for instance would we be able to define summer if there were no winter or health if there were no illness, happiness if there were no sadness, or beauty if there were no ugliness. I suppose most people would say that love is contrasted by hate, but there is another candidate, perhaps, suffering. The word passion, which we use to describe deeply felt emotions such as love, comes from a Latin word meaning to suffer, hence Christ's passion. In fact hatred often has its roots in suffering, for instance, someone who has been deeply hurt by a slight may grow to hate the person or group of people who inflicted the slight instead of forgiving as love demands.

It is through suffering that we come to understand the full meaning of love. Young people in love find their love heightened by the suffering they experience when parted or when they have their first disagreement. Mothers, whose love for their children is unconditional, suffer when their offspring behave contrarily or when they leave home to make their own way in the world; it is part of the price they pay for loving.

Jesus told his disciples not to expect peace but a sword in the establishment of the kingdom of heaven which, as he defined it, was the kingdom of love. In other words they should expect to suffer for the cause of love; "Greater love hath no man than that he lay down his life for his friends." He demonstrated by his own example and in refusing to renounce his vision of the kingdom of love he made sure it would be passed on to succeeding generations. It seems that the deeper we love the more we will suffer at some point in our lives, but then life without love would have no meaning. Perhaps we should see it as our duty to make sure that, just as there is more matter in the universe than antimatter, there is more love than suffering.
