# Andy Warn and Windy Strings

Andy Warn was born in Fishponds and his passion for music began with his playing in a rock band with friends at the age of fourteen. After school though, his dad insisted he got a 'proper' job so he completed an engineering apprenticeship at British Aerospace. After seven years he gave up his well paid job to follow his dream when a friend asked him to join a band to tour the Army and American Air Force bases in Germany for two months. They were paid £100 a week with only two nights off a month and with travel, accommodation and beer expenses Andy returned home with £100 less than when he'd left!

After the band split Andy decided to study the classical guitar to diploma standard and support himself by teaching. In 1984 Maxine came for lessons and Andy was torn between asking her out, and losing £5 a lesson! The former won and they were married in 1986. Together, they enrolled at Newton Park College (now Bath Spa University) for a BA (Hons) music degree. Three years later Maxine completed her PGCE and Andy an M.Mus at Reading University.

When Andy's father's old engineering workshop became available they decided to convert it into a music school, running music lessons and workshops for children and called it 'The Crotchet Factory'. Though the combination of this business and the birth of their children Hannah and Jacob didn't allow Andy to complete his PhD at Bristol University, other projects were imminent. In 1997 Andy saw Glendor at Awkley for sale. Sold to the Ministry of Transport when the M49 was built, the house was derelict. He persuaded Maxine they must bid for it at auction; she agreed thinking they wouldn't get it!

When they did, they sold their house in Eastville, (also by the motorway), rebuilt the house in six months and Andy celebrated his 40th birthday with a party in the large garden.

Several years on, Hannah is at Winchester University studying Contemporary Performance, and Jacob in the lower sixth at QEH, both having started out at Tockington Manor. In addition to teaching and performing, Andy travels the country giving school concerts with a wide variety of instruments including Gamelan, Chinese, African, Indian and Samba. Jacob's mutual love of music, particular recorder playing, prompted the father and son duo 'Windy Strings' to form some three years ago. Jacob, who also plays guitar and violin, enjoys promoting the recorder in schools and in concert to help change its image.

It's not all music; as a family they run half marathons and do triathlons. They are partially self sufficient in vegetables, keep chickens and a pair of peacocks and Andy can play the bagpipes as they have no near neighbours!

# The History of Olveston Schools from 1836 to 1968

Judging by the high buzz of conversation in the coffee break and the frequent cries of 'Look! There's .....!', as local residents pointed at faces or names they recognised in photographs on display at Eric Garrett's recent talk on schooling in Olveston Parish, his latest book is going to be very popular.

Sales were brisk. People from Olveston, Elberton, Aust, Alveston, Thornbury, Pilning and beyond queued to buy copies of a book that contained photographs of their parents, their uncles, their brothers, their teachers, their children's teachers, their friends... Familiar local surnames abound in the photograph captions and sometimes in the text of this book.

Just as fascinating as the photos from the 1940s and 1950s are those from earlier decades, right back to 1871.

Using original school log books and the minutes of the management committee of local people who ran the school before it came under the umbrella of the education authorities, Eric tells a fascinating story of how our local community provided for 'the childen of the labouring classes' in the Victorian period.

The book would make a wonderful Christmas present for anyone with any connection with Olveston School or anyone wanting to know how education developed in a rural community in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. ## Our Parish Matters

Jubilees are not just a cause for celebration but have often been used to focus public subscriptions towards community projects. One can think of buildings founded in Queen Victoria's reign, the provision of sports fields celebrating George V's Silver Jubilee, and even the extensions and renovations funded during Queen Elizabeth II's Silver Jubilee in 1977. With the forthcoming Diamond Jubilee celebrations in mind, what sort of legacy should we leave for future generations that perhaps reflect our current lifestyles? The Parish Council would welcome written views and ideas.

One idea already being considered is the formulation of a 'Parish Plan', which ultimately will encapsulate what parishioners want from their parish. Several other local parishes have already embarked on this process in anticipation of the Government's Localism Agenda, and Olveston hope to do the same. The community needs to identify a shared coherent view across a number of themes that can be then used by the Parish Council and other bodies when planning and determining future priorities. The intention is to identify interested parishioners with a view to instigating this work early in the New Year.

Another potential legacy is the Ingst Wind Farm. There has already been quite a lot of coverage in both the October and November editions of Meeting Point on this emotive subject. Now Olveston Parish Council would especially welcome written views from residents in other parts of the parish whether they are for, against, or undecided/ unbothered, as well as opinions, comments etc.

As previously reported, the War Memorial steps particularly suffered from excessive weathering last winter and care should now be taken around them until the spring when effective repairs can be completed. The Parish Council has approached a number of organizations about repairs and currently awaiting tenders. One suggestion is actually to replace the three remaining steps with four slightly narrower pennant stone steps (30cm wide) so that the bottom step can be closer to the pavement whilst staying within the natural curve of the existing walls. The new steps would be in keeping with the surrounding area, but the overall cost is in the region of £5,000. The Parish Council is pursuing a possible grant that will meet some of the costs, and would welcome any comments on this proposal as well as any donations.

Representatives from South Glos Council visited the October Parish Council meeting with proposals to switch off street lights along the A38 between 00:00 – 05:00 from next spring (although the Fernhill junction shouldn't be affected).

Apparently the financial savings are significant and will repay the cost of modifying each lamp within eight months. To achieve further savings, some urban parishes are also volunteering to have extra street lights included in this scheme, and it may even be possible to arrange for individual lamps to be fitted with appropriate timers. The latter action would only take place with resident approval and after suitable consultations including the police.

# The Five Loaves and Two Fishes Project



#### Food Collections in Olveston

When one thinks of poverty and suffering one calls to mind people living overseas. Much is done by charitable organisations to alleviate suffering, but did you know that in the UK 3.9 million children live in poverty, roughly one-third of the food we buy is thrown away uneaten and within Bristol, especially around St Paul's, many people are homeless, destitute and lacking in basic food provisions?

With this in mind a group called the "Community of the Sisters of the Church", located in Ashley Road, run the "Five Loaves and Two Fishes Project" where on a Sunday afternoon the Sisters give out food parcels to nearly 200 individuals, and they need some 1,500 items every week. It is quite a sight!

Residents in Almondsbury have supported this venture for some time and collections of non-perishable food comprise tins such as rice pudding, fruit, canned fish, baked beans, custard etc and packets of tea bags, cereals, biscuits, pasta etc.

It is hoped to widen the food collection in Severnside and the people who operate Olveston Stores have very kindly agreed to have a collection box located in the shop. So hopefully readers of Meeting Point will place non-perishable items in the box to support this very worthwhile venture. Grateful thanks.

Thornbury & District Museum, now 25 years old, is celebrating with a special Silver Jubilee Exhibition, showcasing twenty-five objects, or groups of objects, that have seldom or never been on display before.

- 1) When a whale was beached at Littleton in 1885, special trains were put on for sight-seers. Part of that whale still survives today and is in our exhibition. Come and find out which part it is!

#### "Christ will always be the light – even in a bleak mid-winter"

As I write this article the airwaves are full of news about the financial crisis which has paralysed Greece and is in the process of bringing down the Italian government as well. By the time you read this article, I cannot predict where we shall be. However, I am not predicting that a white knight will emerge from somewhere to rescue the Euro zone and the economies that depend on it. The US has enough problems of its own and China doesn't seem to be interested.

Here in the UK, we have enough financial strife to be going on with. We have austerity packages which have the potential to tip our economy back into recession once more and unemployment has now topped 2.5 million (over 8%) for the first time since 1994. The level of uncertainty about job security only compounds the problem as people reign in their spending – arguably, as they should.

Those that see Christmas as a time for expensive gifts and lavish living may feel that the festive period will be fairly downbeat this year. Others may even be fearful of the inevitable financial impact of the event, particularly if they are already unemployed with children to cater for. Many will feel that they are indeed heading for a 'bleak mid-winter'.

However, the words of the hymn by the same name speak of a sense of awe which is not about the size of the presents, or the beauty of the surroundings, but the magnificence of Christ, even when pictured as a babe in a manger.

The hymn writer, Christina Georgina Rossetti struggles with what she could possibly give to the one whom cherubim worship night and day. After trawling through the gifts of the shepherd and the wise man, she concludes that the only thing of sufficient value that she can offer is her own heart.

Her conclusion is a message for us all. Christmas should always be first and foremost about relationship. As Christina realised, relationship with Christ was the most valuable thing she could offer. Relationship is not measured in the size of presents but the depth of love. So even in sparse and barren surroundings the light of relationship in Christ shines through. May it attract the attention of many more this Christmas, however bleak the winter.
