

Parish Players - The King and I

Wed. 13 Feb to Sat. 16 Feb. 2013, 7.30pm, Parish Hall, Tockington

The Parish Players have been rehearsing hard for Rodgers' and Hammerstein's 'The King and I', based on the true story of a Victorian school teacher, Anna Leonowens, who bravely went to Bangkok in the 1860s to teach the King's children. This will be the first local production for over 30 years.

Welcoming a significant number of local children into the show has given a new dimension to the Company. There are sixteen young princes and princesses and there is double casting for Anna's son Louis, played by Timothy Mitchell and Jake Woodward. Jake also happens to be the real life cousin of Alexander Morris, who travels to rehearsals from Gloucester and plays the King's eldest son, Prince Chululongkorn. The pivotal role of the King is played by Phil Savage, an experienced and popular actor, with the much coveted role of Anna played by Lynn Shelley. The King's head wife Lady Thiang is played by Lesley Clarke, in her first leading role. Newcomer Laura Pritchard plays Tuptim, with Chris Bentley as Lun Tha, her doomed lover. Ray Hale plays the menacing Prime Minister, the Kralahome.

This is certainly turning out to be a family show. Other smaller parts include David and Margaret Stone's granddaughter Emilia who has the part of Princess Ying Yaowlak, sharing it with Isobel Lambie. Cath Chappell has two grandchildren in the cast, whilst Amy Sutherland, last year's leading lady, also has her daughter Phoebe playing a princess. Other cameo roles are taken by Holly Anderson, Felicity Hemmett, Esther Sully, Helena Osborne, Linda Chappell, Richard Newley, Tad Olewicz and Charlotte Turner. Geoff Chappell returns to play Sir Edward Ramsay, the visiting British ambassador whom the King and Anna are determined to impress, Siam being under the threat of being made a protectorate.

Choreographer Jill Harris has the exciting challenge of teaching Oriental movement and gesture and creating the ballet 'Small House of Uncle Thomas'. She is enjoying working with Maedene Webb who has the central dancing role. The Stage Management aspect of the production is in the capable hands of Keith Richards who has also been busy, with Norma, making all the unusual Oriental props, including a dragon.

Andy Black has once again designed a glittering, opulent set for the 1860s Palace of Bangkok, assisted by Brian Brown and Rod Williams. Richard Churchill as Lighting Designer brings the magical Orient to life. Gill Olewicz has her greatest task yet as Wardrobe Mistress for this exotic production. Musical Director Chloe Alsopp-Jones is in charge of the well-known and much-loved musical score ('Getting to Know You', 'I Whistle a Happy Tune', Shall We

Dance?', 'Hello Young Lovers', 'A Puzzlement' and 'The March of Siamese Children').

The show is under the wonderfully imaginative direction of Linda Evans, who is thrilled to be working with some children whose mothers were in her previous Thornbury production of 1982!

Village people: Bryan and John Gee

Twins Bryan and John Gee were born in Stoke Gifford in 1948. It was then a small village surrounded by farms and Parkway station was a railway shunting yard. There was no family history of farming but from a very young age they both loved animals and while still at primary school used to help on one of the neighbouring farms. They also reared turkeys, cockerels, chickens and calves in their half acre of garden, (they had a very understanding mother!); a good arrangement as their parents financed their feed bills and the boys pocketed the sales!

They moved up to Patchway Secondary Modern, now Patchway Comprehensive on the same site. They played football, rugby and cricket and ran the school printing press, although with dubious spelling ability! At the weekends they helped on a dairy farm across the road, at that time cows were tied in sheds and milked by hand.

They left school at sixteen and worked for Lady White who owned the Hollywood Estate which includes the land at Cribbs Causeway. They remember picking potatoes under what is now Marks and Spencer, and chasing cows in Lady White's Bristol car (the White family owned the firm that made them), along with the chauffeur and the butler! Then Bryan worked at Church Farm and John at Dyers Farm in Easter Compton, getting from home in Stoke Gifford to work on a rusty scooter. They both went to Hartpury Agricultural College, near Gloucester, for a one year course; at that time the college only had sixty students.

Bryan started relief milking on local farms while John went back to Ed Sheldon's at Dyers Farm. One of Bryan's employers was John Alway at New House Farm, Aust. He agreed to help them start their very own farming enterprise, renting them two acres at Northwick for raising pigs. There were no main services on the land but that didn't stop them building sties and sheds to house the pigs. They used LP gas for heating. The water had to be carried in churns from John Alway's dairy in Aust in a very old van with the front seat removed for more carrying capacity. Picking up the water from John's dairy one day, the water and milk churns got muddled up and Bryan had to chase after the milk lorry to sort it out. Bryan used the van for courting Maggy, popping the seat back in, but never fixing it, so he had to be very careful when braking! John Alway helped them tremendously during this time, often lending them his tractor which they returned broken on more than one occasion. They could never have set foot on the farming ladder without his help.

By 1974 they both worked full time on the Northwick Pig Farm, which now had water, electricity and a phone. They had built a pig herd of two hundred and twenty sows, selling seventy to a hundred weaners a week, quite a large herd at the time

By 1977 they persuaded their bank manager to lend them enough money to buy Manor Farm, Aust. They started a dairy herd which they ran with the pigs at Northwick. and had two people working for them. Soon after they bought the farm the interest rate on their loan increased dramatically, peaking at nineteen and a quarter per cent, which gave them a lot of sleepless nights.

Bryan married Maggy, John married Marion, and they both had children. As they had always done the building work on both farms they now think of themselves as builders, and their neighbour David Spratt now farms their land. They do all sorts of building work, often working in lovely places and on beautiful buildings. They have worked on most of the local churches and a lot of listed building in the vicinity. Never throwing anything away, they consider themselves very 'green'. If you need anything for an old building they usually have it.

Both their wives have sadly died and their children have grown up. Bryan's son Chris helps run an agricultural contracting business in Bradford—on-Avon. John likes to stay at home with Jenn and his dog but Bryan has travelled a bit, walking in Nepal and Peru. Last summer he walked around Mont Blanc through France, Switzerland, Italy and back into France, camping with an ex New Zealand dairy farmer.

Although they wouldn't admit to it, I have been told that they are a tremendous asset to the village, as they offer their practical skills at any village function. Neither Bryan nor John wants to retire and both look forward to many more years of building, a job they still enjoy.

Cook's Calendar: February

As we trudge into February we approach what farmers call the 'hungry gap'. This is when the winter vegetables are tired and come to an end but we are not anywhere near harvesting spring vegetables. For someone committed to eating predominantly UK vegetables this

presents problems. Swedes and cabbage are losing whatever appeal they had and the temptation to succumb to Kenyan sugar snaps is almost irresistible.

My veg box answers this conundrum with a weekly cauliflower. For years I struggled to get excited about this most maligned of vegetables, my school experience being limp, over boiled cauliflower which had been sitting on a warm trolley since just after breakfast.

A few years ago I met a woman who worked for the British Food Fortnight and she urged me to rethink cauliflower, telling me it was a prized vegetable in the Mediterranean, as they struggled to grow it in warmer climes. Maybe cauliflower's ubiquity blinds us to its delicate, creamy flavour.

Here is my favourite way to eat cauliflower; the most luxurious soup imaginable. It seems almost magic: take a mundane and overlooked vegetable, add a few delicious extras and you end up with something which is much more than the sum of its parts. A modern day version of stone soup.

Cauliflower Velouté

1 medium cauliflower, roughly chopped into small pieces

1 onion, chopped

1 potato, peeled and chopped into small pieces

2 tablespoons butter

1 litre chicken or veg stock, homemade if possible

125ml white wine

3-4 tablespoons butter40g plain flour125ml soured cream6 tablespoons runny honeyA little nutmeg to serve

Melt the butter in a large pot, add cauliflower, onion and potato and soften for a few minutes.

Add stock and wine and bring to a simmer, cooking until the veg are soft, which should be about 20 minutes, depending on the size of the vegetables.

Meanwhile, melt the butter in a small pan and stir in the flour to make a paste. Add a little soup and stir in, then add the whole contents of the small pan to the vegetable pan, then puree it all, returning it to the large pan when it is smooth.

Add the soured cream and honey, then taste for seasoning, it will need quite a lot. Return to a simmer then sprinkle with freshly grated nutmeg before serving.

Aust Parish Council Matters

The New Year has arrived, and with it the need to review this year's expenditure and make next year's budget. In common with all local authorities, our financial year ends on 31 March. So at the meeting in January the charge to council tax payers for 2013/14 was set at £3,700, the same as last year. This is among the lowest parish precepts in South Gloucestershire.

There are two important planning consultations before us. One, relating to the conversion of a building in Littleton into a house for holiday lets, and the other the Ingst wind farm. The Council is objecting to the wind farm mainly on the ground that it is inappropriate development in the green belt and would be the final nail in the coffin of what is still a very beautiful landscape.

The property in Littleton is the building erected between the White Hart and Quarry House. The applicant's consultant made a presentation to the meeting and the Council deferred a decision until our next meeting on 12th February. Please let your Councillors or me have any comments, and do make your own to the planning officer.

The Council also considered an application for permission to recover the roof of St John's church, Aust, with terned steel to replace the lead that has been stolen on several occasions. Councillors gave this application wholehearted support.

Olveston Parish Council Matters

Have you visited Tockington Play Area recently? Following a joint collaboration between Olveston Pre-school and the Parish Council, December 2012 saw a much needed refurbishment of the play equipment behind the Parish Hall. The final affect is stunning, and should provide excellent play value for a number of years to come. 2012 also saw remedial work on the play equipment in Vicarage Lane which, despite its age, still provides great benefit to the parish.

But, does the Parish lack 'play equipment' for older people, whether teenagers, 20+, parents, grandparents or anyone else who wants to find their 'younger' side? Skate parks or fully fitted gymnasiums often spring to mind, but other alternatives are possible and could be provided if there is sufficient interest and will within the parish.

Indeed provisions such as this could form part of the Parish Vision. As mentioned at the Annual Parish Assembly, and subsequently in Meeting Point, the Parish Council have been striving to form a core of parishioners interested in creating Steering Group to develop a Parish Vision. This group now exists with its own Chairman and Secretary (see www.olvestonparishvision.co.uk for more details). and will involve the parish with its proposals.

February 2013 will also see the Parish Council contacting South Glos. Council about the retirement of three of its Councillors. As previously reported, the Parish Council is keen to hear from anyone interested in finding out about this role. Parishioners are always welcome to attend the Parish Council meetings on the 4th Tuesday of the month (details available on the Parish Notice boards outside the Stores, the Swan at Tockington or by the Bus Shelter at Old Down).

South Glos. Council will have to ascertain whether a formal election is required, or alternatively ask the Parish Council to co-opt parishioners, through an informal interview selection process. The intention is to complete the process by the end of March, and certainly in time for the next Annual Parish Assembly scheduled for April 25th 2013.

Public Rights of Way - in a nutshell

South Gloucestershire Council's Public Rights of Way team has three officers each looking after an area of about 13 parishes. We are responsible for maintaining footpaths (not footways/pavements), bridleways and restricted byways for use by the public; advising on planning applications which may affect existing public rights of way or provide opportunities for new ones; doing legal work concerning adding, diverting or removing paths from the network; and liaising with landowners, developers, contractors, user groups, the public and parish councils.

Maintaining paths in a useable condition involves dealing with complaints, contacting landowners, and carrying out improvement works where needed (which can include major resurfacing, especially on bridleways). Many people do not know that broken or overgrown stiles and gates are the responsibility of the landowner, as are overhanging hedges. The Council is responsible for the surfaces of paths but does not usually own the land over which they run. We are continually in touch with landowners about the repair or replacement of worn or broken path furniture, access for surface works, or about paths which have become obstructed for a variety of reasons because, legally, it is a landowner's responsibility to keep their paths clear. However, it is the Council's policy to assist landowners subject to budget restraints. We arrange a twice yearly vegetation cut of around 250 paths in the SGC area which are the most well used and we also have a Ranger who carries out clearance work and some repairs/replacements. We rely heavily on the public and user groups to let us know about problems and it is very helpful if people are prepared to carry secateurs! We also have two very good Avon Ramblers volunteer work parties who carry out clearance and installation work on a fortnightly basis as well as internal and external contractors who carry out larger or specialist works. We are always very busy and juggle many jobs at once - endless lists of things to do and red flagged emails!

The flip side of talking to landowners about their paths is trying to help them with their complaints about irresponsible walkers; especially dog walkers who do not keep to the paths, do not pick up after their dog or allow their dogs to chase livestock. Many people do not realise that dog faeces can easily get into the food chain, either via contaminated crops or ingested by farm animals. Contaminated food crops or livestock may be rejected and cattle particularly are at risk of liver damage and the meat may be condemned. Pregnant animals that have been chased by dogs will often abort, if they are not more badly injured. This has significant financial implications for food producers and they find it frustrating that they have little protection. We make up signs for them to put up near their footpaths and in some cases we liaise with the dog wardens and the Police.

Public paths are classified as highways and have the same legal protection as roads. People often assume that if a path isn't used for a number of years it will cease to exist, or that it can be moved a few metres for convenience. However, the legal line of any path is recorded on the Definitive Map, which was created following the 1949 National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act and was the subject of a process that lasted many years. The legal line prevails and no changes can be made to a path without a legal order. Although there are some disputes about whether or not a path exists or is in the right place, which generally needs to be settled by a court, these are relatively few. However, we get several applications each year for paths to be added to the Definitive Map as a result of long use, or for existing paths to be diverted. These have to go through a legal process and meet certain criteria before being submitted to a SGC Sub Committee, and can result in a public inquiry if they are controversial.

2000 Years of Earning a Living in Bath

Wednesday, 6 February 2013, 7.30pm, Olveston Methodist Church

The Director of **The Museum of Bath at Work** is going to give an illustrated talk about some of the ways in which the people of Bath have earned a living during past centuries.

Did you know Bath had a rather fine car-manufacturer in the early twentieth century – one with a not very English-sounding name? Bath also had (and still has) miners – stone miners - working 30 metres under the beautiful Bath countryside, these days with very state-of the-art equipment. Journalists and secretaries have a Bath resident to thank for an invention which makes their work easier. And Nick Park of Aardman Animations could never have created Wallace and Gromit without another Bath-patented invention, manufactured in Bathampton from 1900 until the 1980s. Come and find out about all these and more, in the history of Bath at work.

Although we have always found the weather a great topic of conversation, 2012 has given us a lot to talk about. It was the second wettest year on record – ironic if you consider that we were being warned of droughts and hose-pipe bans in March last year. And rather sobering in a world where one in ten doesn't have access to safe drinking water.

I've been thinking about water in a different context, preparing a sermon on Jesus's visit to that wedding in Cana, when over a hundred gallons of water were turned into wine (John 2). Behind this Sunday-school favourite is the notion that if we offer ourselves to God, he can take the mundane water of our ordinary lives, and transform it into the abundant new wine of his kingdom. One of the great blessings that this new wine symbolises is peace with God. The evangelist John wrote, "to all who believed him and accepted him, he gave the right to become children of God." (John 1:12). That's a tremendous blessing – not a guaranteed release from our difficulties, but a peace that passes all understanding, to carry us through the hard times.

In the Netherlands in the summer of 2000, two dykes failed, causing widespread flooding and damage. The problem was not heavy rain, as one might imagine, but prolonged hot dry weather that had caused the peat inside the dykes to dry out, compromising their structural integrity.

It's all too easy for us to dry out spiritually, to lose that sense of peace with God. To maintain our spiritual integrity, we need to find ways of watering our spiritual lives regularly. The season of Lent is an excellent opportunity to do just that. This year, rather than *giving* something up, why not *take* something up – a daily Bible reading, or a weekly Lent group, for example? And as you do, let God turn water into wine once again, and experience his peace and his presence in your life.

Enough mixed metaphors for one month – the rain has stopped outside and I'm off out for a walk. I think I'll take my umbrella with me, however, just in case
