

# Waxwings and Blackcaps

Although the days are brightening, winter can often give us an unpleasant reminder of its power as we go through February. A hard winter brings hope for a waxwing year and a mild one the sight of a blackcap.

A waxwing year is when the cold Scandinavian winter drives the waxwings in desperation across the North Sea to us. It doesn't happen every year and when it

does the birds are more often seen on the east coast of Britain..However, they can be driven down to the Severn Valley in hard times.

A picture of a waxwing is the bird on the cover of the magazine and you can see what a beautiful bird it is. It is not a shy bird and can often be see in supermarket car parks. In November 2012 the birding website www.severnside birds.com reported waxwings in a supermarket car park in Avonmouth Way.

In contrast to the waxwing the blackcap can be seen around your bird table. As a warbler and insect eater, it normally flies south for winter but in recent years some have decided to stay with us. Look for an almost uniformly grey bird with a black cap on his head. I say 'he' because it is only the male that has the eponymous black cap on his head; the female is similar in every respect except she has a chestnut-brown cap on her head. The blackcap is very distinctive but doesn't linger long at the bird feeder, normally pecking voraciously at a fat-ball.

# Village people: James Leaver and Dan Lewis-Leaver

James and Dan have recently moved to Olveston, but as children they lived in Rudgeway and went to Marlwood School, so are certainly local. They come from a musical family, Motown Soul music was always played at home, and they became obsessed with music towards the end of their time at school. James and Dan had very extensive collections of vinyl records and they attended live music gigs in Bristol. They were into, amongst other things, grunge music (a sort of cross between punk and rock) in the early 1990s. They never had formal lessons and are completely self-taught. At the end of the sixth form James formed a band playing Indy music, he played the bass guitar, and Dan learnt the drums in order to join the band.

After school James went to Brunel Technical College where he met a guitarist/songwriter, they formed a band with Dan and began to move amongst a musical network in Bristol. Dan went to Catering College in Bristol and they then began to meet more advanced musicians who had been playing longer and had studied music. They moved into Bristol and gradually became immersed in the music scene in their spare time. Between 1992 and 1994 they broke into the scene themselves and played gigs in Bristol, Sheffield and at Ashton Court Festival.

Their first band was called 'Supergrover', which broke up when the guitarist left. After playing in a couple of other bands, their next permanent band was called 'Box of Frogs', Dan now singing, James changing to guitar and both taking on song writing responsibility. They have never made much money from the band but have made their own CDs. The other guitarist in the 'Box of Frogs' was tutored by someone who had a recording studio; there they recorded their first album released on HORR, House of Rest Records. They pressed the album and did the artwork themselves, and are self-managed. James, who is the PR man, took the CDs to record shops on a sale or return basis and they also sold them at concerts.

They then had a break of a few years while James married and started a family and Dan learnt the guitar. Two years ago they started a new band 'Pilot Whale Research' (none of the band names means anything), and have played a few gigs. The Folk House in Park Street is their preferred type of venue, and they can fill it for a gig. Their brother-in-law Mike joined them; he plays the keyboard and sings. There was then another break when Dan married and started a family, but now they live close together in Olveston they can practise weekly. Dan is now the singer/songwriter; he has a digital recording kit and has written their new album.

James and Dan realised that St Mary's Church has great acoustics, requested an audition which was successful, and details of their forthcoming concert are below.



# 'Pilot Whale Research' live in concert

On Saturday 8th February 2014, 'Pilot Whale Research' will perform an evening of music live in St Mary's Church, Olveston.

Brothers Dan Lewis-Leaver and James Leaver will be previewing songs from their forthcoming release 'We Gathered in Circles until the Sea Turned Red'. The two brothers will also be joined by their long-time collaborator, and brother-in-law, Mike Meade for the second half of the show.

#### Commentary

January was a cold month with significant rain and snow mid-month. Average temperature was 1°C below norm. February and March were very cold months with high pressure centred over Scandinavia bringing Arctic winds which resulted in February being 2°C below, and March 3.5°C below, norm. It was the coldest March for 50 years. Rainfall was close to average. April and May continued the cold dry theme for spring, which was the coldest since 1976 with both months registering average temperatures 2°C below norm. June was very dry, being the driest since 1995. Temperature however was close to normal. July, with high pressure firmly established, was dry and at 3°C above norm was the hottest since 2006. August was a month of sunshine and showers with normal temperatures, but about half the average rainfall. September was a changeable month with much cloud but little rain, this being an inch below normal. In October a succession of Atlantic low pressure systems brought significant amounts of rain, this being 2 inches over norm, but average temperature was 1°C over that expected at this time of year. November was wet and windy at the beginning of the month with a severe gale on the 3<sup>rd</sup> but after mid-month it was dry and cloudy. Rainfall and

temperature were marginally below normal. **December** for the half of the month was overcast but mainly dry and reasonably mild, but for the latter part of the month Atlantic low pressure systems dominated with heavy rain and gales. Atmospheric pressure was close to normal but temperature was 1.5°C above norm and rainfall was nearly 1.5 inches above that normally experienced.

**Summarising the year**: we had a very cold winter and spring with warm dry conditions in mid-year and with autumn returning to normal pattern being reasonably mild and wet. Annual rainfall was close to average and approximately 20 inches less than for 2012. Pressure and temperature were close to average.

#### Dear Residents of Olveston,

As you are all aware, we have been building 4 houses on the former feed mill site opposite the Olveston Stores. The project is moving swiftly forward to completion in the New Year. I am

confident that the care and attention to detail in meeting all of the local authorities' conservation criteria for the external façades of the buildings will only enhance the look and feel of your village.

Due to the site being so close to the old quarry it was inevitable that digging was not going to be easy and, sure enough, after only going down 18 inches we hit the solid lime stone bed rock. After a couple of re-welded digger buckets and several blown hydraulic hoses, 70 digging days later we finished all foundation and drainage excavations. As the work was progressing many of you saw the large concrete pipes that were being installed below ground between The Street and the new houses. These are now acting as holding tanks for all the surface rain water for the development, as due to the rock there is no natural percolation.

All this water has to go somewhere; you've guessed it, straight into the existing culvert in The Street. However, this culvert was on South Gloucestershire Council's 'to do' list, as I found out when I contacted them after inspecting it myself and deeming it to be in a state of disrepair. It emerged that the culvert was blocked, not with mud or leaves but with a 9 inch mains gas pipe and BT ducting, that had both been laid directly across the bottom of the culvert 10 or more years ago. Of the 11-12 weeks that followed to resolve this problem, Halsall Construction's works to connect to the mains sewer in the road only took 4 days from start to finish. So I would like to thank you for your patience, as having the temporary traffic lights up for this length of time was not easy for anyone. Now you have a new culvert across the road and one in the foot path. We have also installed a surface water drain across the entrance to the development from the public carriageway, which should go some way to limiting the flooding & ponding that has occurred in the past at this junction.

I would like to thank Peter & Judith Dawes, Nigel & Julie Dawes and Sanjay Dom & family, with all of whom we have had to share the access to the site, for their patience and cooperation during this project. Also thank you to the Olveston Stores, not only for their patience but also for keeping my site team fed and watered, along with The Crusty Loaf Bakery. I know we couldn't have done it without you.

# Olveston Parish Council Matters

Looking for ways to keep the Parish informed? Trying to generate interest in forthcoming events? Certainly the Parish Council is very interested in ways of spreading information to keep residents informed, and is currently trialling a Facebook page (<a href="https://www.facebook.com/pages/Olveston-Parish-Council/533174733392552">https://www.facebook.com/pages/Olveston-Parish-Council/533174733392552</a>) in addition to its regular 'Parish Matters' contributions, articles on the Olveston Website (<a href="https://www.olveston.com">www.olveston.com</a>) and on its three notice boards distributed about the Parish.

These notice boards have limited space for third party contributions. Unfortunately the Council has recently received complaints about the number of fly posters and the time they have been left up. One alternative might be to install more notice boards, or for existing organisations to 'swap' space on their own boards. From the 4<sup>th</sup> January 2014 Olveston Methodist Hall is hosting the new 'internet café', which in addition to being open to all parishioners (whatever their level of computing ability) might increase access to electronic 'adverts'. Comments would be welcome on how better to balance the aesthetics of the Parish with the need to support local events.

The Parish Council has also received complaints from several families about high pitched alarms being sited around Olveston. Whilst these devices are nominally sited to discourage cats, they are particularly unpleasant for everyone who can hear the high pitched noise they create. Please could householders refrain from using these devices in their front gardens or where they could affect any pedestrians on communal footpaths, and play areas such as the concrete triangle between Bramley Close and Laxton Close.

Olveston Parish will again be 'hosting' the annual Severn Bridge Road Race on Sunday  $2^{nd}$  March from 11:00-13:45. Neither the Parish Council nor South Glos Council have powers to prevent the race occurring, although we can object to any road closures or requests for residents to move parked cars. The situation is being monitored by the Severn Safety Stronger Community Group which includes representatives from Avon and Somerset Police. It can only be hoped that this race will pass off without incident and with minimal disruption to local residents.

Olveston Parish Council is also keen to hear from anyone interested in becoming a Councillor, and you are most welcome to contact the Parish Clerk or existing Councillors via email or by phone. Parishioners are always welcome to attend the Parish Council meetings on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month. Ideally new Councillors will be introduced to the Parish at this year's Annual Parish Assembly scheduled for Tuesday April 29<sup>th</sup> 2014.
