

Village people: Stephen and Amanda Symonds



Stephen and Amanda took over as head and registrar respectively of Tockington Manor School in August 2013. They are delighted at the opportunity to continue leading a school which is held in high regard in the independent sector and stands for all that is good in educational and family values.

They both come from Kent and met when Amanda was studying science and Stephen had decided that retail management was not for him, and had returned briefly to stay with his parents before starting a four year teacher training degree. They married at Christmas 1995, by which time Amanda had also qualified as a teacher and they were both working in primary schools in Kent.

They moved on to be House Parents at Friars Prep School in Ashford where Stephen became Deputy Head. The next move was for Stephen to be Headmaster of Thetford Grammar Junior School for four years. However they missed the feel of a boarding school, and the 'wrap around care' that such schools provide. So the next move was for Stephen to take the headship of another prep school in Hampshire for five years. By now they had two sons, George and Archie, and the time came to move to Tockington.

Arriving in lovely, hot August weather, Stephen and Amanda had a string of visits from family and friends. The very first weekend saw them and their

visitors at Thornbury Rugby Club for a fun performance by the Wurzels. What an introduction to Somerset for Kentish folk!

They are proud of the wide range of opportunities offered at Tockington Manor. Apart from academic success (year 8 pupils regularly obtain scholarships for their next school), they reckon that the whole school is one of the fittest. They have sport every day, excellent PE teachers and pupils who compete at national level. The weekly newspaper 'Tockington Tim', written and edited by the pupils themselves and overseen by the English department, received a national award last summer.

Nowadays it is primarily a day school, with only twenty boarders cared for by house parents, and very flexible opening times. Pupils can arrive as early as 7.30am for breakfast and leave at 4pm or stay on for extracurricular activities until 7.30pm. Saturday is an action packed affair with children being able to take part in sport, camp craft, drama, swimming, engineering activities and inter school fixtures. They can also board for a night or two if necessary and it must be stressed there is a very strict registration system to cater for such flexibility. The Nursery section is growing steadily and, on a recent inspection, was judged as being excellent in all categories. It's an integral part of the school, is involved in all social functions and when I was there a decorated lantern (jam jar actually!) competition was open to school and Nursery. I also noticed that the framed art work in the entrance hall was definitely 'nursery produced.'

The school ethos is 'making the most of every moment'. Above all it is a happy school, with every pupil meeting their potential. Stephen and Amanda look on the whole school as their extended family and are looking forward to many happy years in Tockington. They are keen for the school to be involved with the church and village and would be happy for people and organisations in the community to get in touch on 01454 613229.

Flights of fancy: Winter Thrushes

As winter bites into the New Year, spare a thought for those birds that have flown in from the north to enjoy our milder climate. Our native bird populations will swell with many millions of birds and at this time of year two thrushes in

particular are worth looking out and listening for.

The first of these is the redwing, which has the thrush's spots and, as its name suggests, is picked out by a reddish orange patch just below its folded wing and seen underneath it when it flies. You may also notice its broad eye stripe. It's given away by the thin "tseep" sound it makes and, on a starry night, you will hear one call as it flies over your head in the darkness.

The redwing's cousin is the fieldfare which also has the thrush's spots but is identified by its grey head and a brown back. You will often hear it in the hedgerows and fields with a voice which has been described as "chackling".

Either type will happily sit in berry bushes such as pyracantha or cotoneaster eating until all the fruit is stripped or dark falls.

They will eat old apples if you have any, and the blackbirds don't get them first. Look for them in orchards, you don't have far to go.

A good spot is the old orchard alongside the short road between the car park and the northern lagoons at Oldbury Power Station.

I have just been immobilised for three months and was given the loan of a mobility scooter. This totally revolutionised my life as it gave instant independence and the ability to get to village shops and visit friends. It also opened my eyes to the problems that people with disabilities encounter - parked cars on pavements, dustbins in the middle of paths, and overgrowing shrubs and trees, all of which create a great risk when one has to mount the curb or use the road to by pass obstacles.

I must also add that I have found most people extremely helpful and willing to assist. However, inconsiderate parking has been a nightmare. Happily my incapacity has been temporary but it has made me aware of the problems for those that live with it daily. It would be good if people were to remember those less fortunate than themselves. As a lady commented to me, 'nobody would willingly be in a wheelchair or scooter, but needs must ...'

'Hello Dolly'

February will soon be 'showtime' for the Parish Players and rehearsals are gathering momentum now that Christmas is behind us. 'Hello Dolly!' is an American comedy by Jerry Herman, beginning life as a 19th Century Austrian farce and later becoming Thornton Wilder's popular play 'The Matchmaker'. Tom Stoppard's 'On the Razzle' has a similar theme, of two young men escaping from a curmudgeonly employer to go 'on the town' where they meet charming romantic attachments.

Dolly Levi, a matchmaker, has the pivotal role and this is a well-earned opportunity for Laura Pritchard, who joined our company last year to play Tuptim in 'The King & I'. Andy Black, who has once again designed an exciting New York set, also plays the acerbic Horace Vandergelder, Dolly's toughest matchmaking challenge to date! His all-singing, all-dancing shop assistants. Cornelius and Barnaby, are cast by Ray Hale and Chris Bentley. Lesley Clarke as Irene Malloy, a widowed hat shop owner and Amy Sunderland as Minnie, her somewhat timid assistant, complete the romantic quartet. Ermengarde, Horace's lovelorn niece is played by Esther Sully and Ambrose, her artist beau, by Richard Newley. Linda Chappell has the fun of playing Ernestina, a totally unsuitable match for Horace, whilst Mike Belsten plays a long suffering Prussian Head Waiter. Jill Harris is in charge of the challenging choreography, including the famous 'Waiter's Gallop' at the Harmonia Gardens Restaurant, with all the culinary props, and all the waltzes, quick-steps, foxtrots and good old-fashioned marches that pepper the show. Keith Richards as Stage Manager (ably assisted by Norma) is already burning the midnight oil making the unusual props (such as a large roast turkey with all the trimmings!) and is assisted backstage by Rod Williams and Brian Brown. Wardrobe Mistress, Gill Olewicz is in charge of the colourful 1890s costumes.

The multi-roled chorus is busy rehearsing the memorable ensemble numbers such as 'Before the Parade Marches By', 'Elegance', 'Put on your Sunday Clothes' and, of course, 'Hello Dolly'. Musical Director Chloe Allsopp-Jones and Linda Evans as Director look forward to entertaining you, the audience, the most important element of the production. The show will run in February half-term week, with performances nightly at 7.30pm from Wed. 19th to Sat. 22nd in the Olveston Parish Hall, Tockington.

Olveston Parish Council Matters

Flooding is a regular concern within the Parish whether on the Common, outside the Stores or even down Haw Lane. At the Annual Parish Assembly, the Environment Agency gave a talk on its defences along the Severn Estuary (a copy of which is on the Olveston website). Responsibility for the management and maintenance of our flood defence and drainage systems also lies with the Lower Severn Internal Drainage Board (www.lowersevernidb.org.uk).

Drainage authorities have general supervisory functions and powers. They can make byelaws to ensure and protect adequate drainage systems and works. Open drainage channels need to be regularly dredged and vegetation controlled; and underground storm water culverts need to be kept in good repair and maintained. It is therefore important that if you notice blocked ditches, or if you are planning any works on your property that may affect drainage, you first contact the Lower Severn Internal Drainage Board.

South Gloucestershire Over Fifties Forum recently celebrated its 20th birthday and, with over 4,500 members, is a network and platform for senior citizens in the South Gloucestershire area. It aims to raise the profile of the needs, values and interests of senior citizens in South Gloucestershire and to speak up about social, economic and community issues that affect senior citizens, through a series of regular forums.

In addition to a quarterly newsletter, regular afternoon (2pm – 4pm) meetings are held at Community Centres including Hanham, The Shireway, and at Filton. Speakers at recent meetings have included Chris Skidmore (MP for Kingswood), lan Boulton Chair of South Glos Council and Amanda Deekes, Chief executive of South Glos Council. The next meeting is on Tuesday 21st January 2014 at Warmley, with speakers from the South Glos Council Transport Team. Vacancy on the Parish Council

We duly gave notice of the vacancy, and no election was requisitioned, so the Council intends to co-opt a new Councillor at its meeting on 14th January 2014 from amongst those who have expressed an interest.

Proposed Ingst wind farm

Without in any way reducing its opposition to the proposal, the Council initiated a meeting with the intending developers of the wind farm to explore the size and nature of their proposed community fund. Between the time of writing and publication, we hope to complete discussions with nearby Parish Councils and with REG to ensure that, if consent is given, there will be a community benefit fund under the control of local people.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 14th January 2014. The Council will consider its budget for the next financial year, and fix its precept.


we checked the map, however about to leave the frog jumped terrified everyone in my group and the night as fast as we could, for could. However, we had the good

Be aware! Rogue traders use such tactics to extort money from residents or to gain entry into people's homes with a view to committing distraction burglaries. If you are not expecting a caller, be suspicious. Never let cold callers into your home. Use door chains and ask the caller to leave.
