Sow and Grow

St Mary's latest appeal, Sow and Grow, had a very successful launch on Sunday 2nd December and is aiming to raise £15000 in total, £5000 for Olveston School and £10,000 for a village, Myange, in Rwanda. Over fifty people came to the tea party, where they heard about the two parts of the appeal.

The preliminary design for the reflective area for Olveston School, was displayed which looks very exciting! This incorporates many of the features that children had requested, including seating areas, a solar powered water feature and maze. Amanda Luke, headteacher of Olveston School, explained the importance for children to have space to sit quietly and reflect.

This was followed by Mike Beresford, from CED, who gave an excellent presentation on the Rwanda side of the appeal. The aim here is to help returning refugees from Tanzania, by training them how to make rainwater storage tanks, develop a kitchen garden and make their homes more weather resilient. This is a brilliant project which should be sustained for years to come. Each family



should be able to support themselves and then share their skills with others.

Look out for fundraising activities in the New Year. The first planned fundraising event is a singalong to the film "The Greatest Showman" (the cinema hit of 2018, with Hugh Jackman as P.T.Barnum). It will be held in the church on 19 January at 6pm (a family event, hence the early start). Come along dressed as a circus performer (there will be a prize on the night) and start practising your juggling skills. Tightrope walkers & stilt walkers will need to bring their own risk assessments! See posters for details. The Sound of Music



It's almost time to book your tickets for the Parish Players' energetic and colourful 2019 production of 'The Sound of Music', which is coming to the Parish Hall in Tockington for February half term. The musical is based on Maria von Trapp's book 'The Story of the Trapp Family Singers', a true love story set shortly before the Second World War in Austria.

We meet Maria, a postulant nun, as she leaves her convent in Salzburg to become a governess to the seven children of widower Captain von Trapp. Although intended to be a temporary arrangement, events take a different course! We follow the von Trapp family as they are caught up in Austria's struggles with the Nazi regime and have to choose whether to try and escape with their lives and leave their beloved homeland forever.

The last of Rodgers & Hammerstein's fantastic scores, and possibly the best known and most loved, 'The Sound of Music' was first performed on Broadway in 1959, so 2019 is its 60th anniversary year. Come along to enjoy its many

memorable songs, including 'Do, Re, Mi', 'The Lonely Goatherd', 'So Long, Farewell', 'Edelweiss', 'My Favourite Things', 'Climb Every Mountain' and, of course, 'The Sound of Music'. The Company is delighted to be immersed in the uplifting music and songs, once again under the skilful guidance of Chloe Allsopp-Jones as Musical Director.

The strong principal cast is led by experienced actress Sarah Wiggins, debuting with the Company as Maria, and Dan Phillips, making a welcome return to take the role of Captain von Trapp, which requires him to play the guitar! They head the family, which includes newcomer Matilda Evans as youngest child Gretl, with Zoe Bonnett double-cast with Evie Snadden as Louisa, and Sophie Allsopp-Jones and Lizzie Barnes sharing the role of Marta. Isobel Lambie takes the role of Brigitta, with Cameron Phillips as Kurt, and Jake Woodward as Friedrich. Talia Nicholls plays Liesl.

Marcus Burton joins the Company to play Liesl's sweetheart Rolf. Louise Luft plays Maria's trusted adviser, the Mother Abbess. Meanwhile, Amy Sunderland is cast as von Trapp's fiancée, the Baroness, and David Proud is impresario Max. We welcome back Cynthia Black to play housekeeper Frau Schmidt, and Richard Newley as Franz the butler. Cameo parts include Paul Dimery as Admiral von Schreiber, and Phil Savage as the mysterious Herr Zeller, alongside his off-stage role as Front of House Manager.

Jill Harris is once again in charge of choreography, which includes colourful folk dance, and our dedicated group of nuns are busy perfecting their Latin chanting!

The challenging scenery features the mountains surrounding the Von Trapp's villa, as well as the Nonnberg Abbey, but we can rely on Andy Black and his team to create the beautiful views and the convent's serene atmosphere. Andy Allsopp-Jones as Stage Manager and Richard Churchill as Lighting Designer, with Cath Chappel as Wardrobe Mistress and her husband Mike in charge of Sound Effects, complete the production team.

The show is in the experienced and capable hands of Linda Evans as Director, whose talent and guidance have brought us so many superb productions. Everyone involved is looking forward to a joyful and memorable show week in February. Make sure you are there to enjoy it too!

The Sound of Music takes place during half term week on Wednesday 20th to Saturday 23rd February, at the Parish Hall, Tockington: curtain up at 7.30pm.

So, why are we 'Making Space for Wildlife'? Melinda Evans

One of the consequences of moving to a different country is that you are constantly trying to figure out what is 'normal'. One of my childhood memories from growing up in rural Australia is of my dad always having to scrape multiple insect casualties off our car windscreen. Fast forward roughly 20 years and a move to Britain, I noticed this rather morbid job was rarely





needed. Innocently at first, I put this down to insects sharing my reluctance for cooler weather, only to realise over time this was not normal for Britain either. There have been enormous changes to the abundance of British wildlife in the last 40 years.

The United Nations has recently said biodiversity loss is as urgent an issue as climate change. A sobering fact is that the UK has lost most of its grassland and meadow habitats upon which the absent insects, and many creatures and plants upwards and downwards in the food chain, depend. Cue Olveston Parish Council's Biodiversity project: "Making Space for Wildlife", which aims to take positive steps to improve our local environment.

Since it started in 2017, the project and its volunteers have already achieved a great deal. Following the launch with an inspiring presentation by ecologist and television presenter Mike Dilger, it has supported the 2017 Charter for Trees Woods and People and planted a commemorative tree in the Olveston Vicarage Lane playground. Two more trees have been planted with our two local schools, Olveston Primary and Tockington Manor. In collaboration with the A Forgotten Landscape project and South Gloucestershire Council, we have enriched the Aust Road verge with seed and plug plants of wild flowers to help restore our lost grasslands habitats.

Our plans for the future include a community orchard, wildlife surveys and mapping. We will also be launching our project logo designed by local children. However, the project depends on the skills, imagination, support and energy of the people living in our parish. 

January heralds in Twelfth Night on the 6th of the month and that marks the end of the Christmas festivities. But it is also a celebration in itself, marking the beginning of the season of Epiphany which lasts until Lent.

It's also the day that, across Europe and the Christian world, we celebrate the visit of the Three Kings to Jesus and was the occasion when they experienced their Epiphany moment (epiphany being defined as 'a moment of sudden and great revelation or realisation'). For the Three Kings it was the moment they realised that in the child Jesus they were in the presence of God come to earth; God in human form.

Many Christians have shared that epiphany moment, a moment when they too realised that we have a God who touched the earth and became a human in order to save us from ourselves; one who was sent with framework in which to live and who gave us an overarching ethic of love.

Some may have their epiphany early in life but for many that spark of realisation does not come easily and we might rage and fight against it for decades, I know I did. But if, and when, that moment does arrive, you will know it; you will come to know that your soul is not alone in the universe, that there is a God. A God that, although we might struggle to define, who is a God who constantly challenges us, is ultimately a God who is able to touch the earth and who can touch your life too. A God on whom we can rely to love us and guide our lives.
