



Thornbury Camera Club is celebrating its 50<sup>th</sup> birthday this year and, to mark the occasion, has teamed up with Thornbury & District Museum to stage an exhibition highlighting photographic developments of the last 50 years and beyond. The exhibition is in two parts. 'Thornbury Camera Club – The first 50 years' - displays equipment lent by members and

friends of Thornbury Camera Club and these items will bring back many memories - and provoke a few questions. For example, do you know what a 'Vest Pocket' camera is and why it was advertised as 'The Soldier's Camera'?

The Museum's own contribution to the account of local photography tells the stories of Thornbury's professional photographers, from the Victorian 'flash, bang, wallop' era to WW2. As the song goes: "There's always been a photographer to record the 'appy scene!" Discover what those professional photographers thought was worth photographing in their day.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The annual parish meeting took place on 9th April at Elberton Village Hall. Peter Tyzack, of A Forgotten Landscape, gave a presentation on the Severn Vale Festival, which takes place annually. The Chairman of Aust Parish Council presented the Council's report for the year and Councillor Riddle gave an update on progress made by South Gloucestershire Council. # The Severn Ferry, a tale of a tail

Although the Severn Ferry has long since drifted into history, it is still remembered fondly by many. People from all over the country affectionately remember journeys over the Severn on business or in the course of family holidays.

There are records of a ferry in the vicinity of Aust and Beachley in Roman times. In later years the franchise to run it was owned by the local landowners, the Beaufort family and their predecessors. The crossing was an important

one for the Royal Mail coaches, linking Wales to London. A ferry service at Old Passage seems to have been run until around 1862, when it became uneconomical. At this time The Great Western Railway inaugurated the New Passage Ferry further downstream, linked by a railway line to Bristol. This was largely superseded by the opening of the Severn Railway Tunnel in 1886.

From 1862 until 1926 no regular ferry service was provided at Old Passage. In 1926 the well-respected Mr Enoch Williams, a local legend, set up The Old Passage Severn Ferry Company. An inaugural trip was organised on the motorboat 'Silver Queen' with many local dignitaries including the Mayor and Mayoress of Bristol. The boat was full, almost overcrowded, but conveyed everyone safely to Wales and back, boding well for the future.

Enoch, his staff and board of directors, built up the business and in 1931 operated the first motor-car ferry across the Severn. As part of the publicity it was pointed out that the ferry saved a journey of 55 miles and took around 15 minutes. The caveat, 'subject to the weather, tide and circumstances permitting', appeared on impressive timetables to accommodate the vagaries of the River Severn. Many pleasant memories of voyages are connected to two principal vessels the Severn King and Queen. Trade was steady and although affected by the Second World War, continued. In May 1944 alone, 1500 American Army vehicles were carried without mishap.

One regular feature of the Severn Ferry, perhaps a blight on a hard-working company, was the many complaints from the public about the service. Copious files of ministerial deliberations prompted by public letters of complaint exist. Rare examples of cars leaving the ferry to the safety of a jetty only to then park in the muddy waters of the Severn can be found. By far the majority of the letters complain that the 15 minute journey had taken longer, two hours or more, or sailings had not been made at all. These instances masked the fact of thousands of safe car landings and timetables being adhered to. Fatalities do not feature in the paperwork at all, but historically these had occurred.

An assortment of vessels had been used as ferries over the years, many of these were sailing boats. In September 1839 The Monmouthshire Merlin and other local papers reported that a ferry boat called Despatch was crossing in high seas when the wind rose to a perfect hurricane. Being the Sabbath, the service would not normally have run, but a group of people persuaded the captain to sail. On board was a carriage, 5 horses, a dog, about 7 passengers and 4 crew, the vessel foundered, and all were lost. One person, a cattle dealer, was alleged to have had 300 gold sovereigns on his person, which must have weighed him down. He left a widow and 8 children.

In April 1855 a sailing boat set sail from Beachley in a gentle breeze with a full cargo. This included 5 cattle, a horse, 20 sheep and lambs with 30 pigs. There were also around 16 passengers and crew. Three sails were hoisted to speed

the journey and all went well until about six yards from Aust pier. Here the vessel struck an underwater pile and sank immediately in fourteen feet of water. The crew managed to get ashore, but at least seven or eight passengers drowned, seven more were rescued. One lucky passenger managed to grasp the tail of a cow as they both floundered in the water. The startled cow bolted towards the shore bringing the man with her and saving his life.

In October 1862 the Severn crossing claimed a further 5 lives, 1 passenger was rescued. Many of the casualties of the disasters were never recovered and the condition of those who were are detailed in distressing depth at public

inquests.



The long history of the early Severn crossings is marred by disasters which will never be forgotten. Perhaps it is good that when recalling memories today those most commonly mentioned are the halcyon days of Enoch Williams, his staff and the Severn King and Queen.

**Cuckoos** Trevor Cook



I can still remember a verse from William Wordsworth's poem,

To seek thee did I often rove Through woods and on the green; And thou wert still a hope, a love; Still longed for, never seen.

However, I have to report that I haven't heard one this year; and thus there were none to seek. Or perhaps it's only me?



It is an unfortunate fact, however, that the cuckoo is in serious decline and the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) report that we have lost 50% of the numbers of 'our' cuckoos in the last 20 years.

The causes for this decline are not known; tracking their migration routes from Africa has revealed that those that choose

to travel through Spain (as against Italy) are suffering the worst losses. Some speculate about drought and wildfires in Spain, others that the problem may be that one of their favourite food sources, the hairy caterpillars of the Garden Tiger Moth, has also declined by 92% in this period.

Whatever the reason it is sad to think that our children might grow up without hearing the herald of the spring? We don't know all the answers to the losses, but we all know of some little gesture or change we can make to our landscapes that can make a difference to both the Tiger Moths and the Cuckoos

Over the centuries, a public execution was frequently a form of entertainment. The evidence for Jesus' death was brutal, public, unavoidable. Jesus' resurrection from the dead, however, does not take place in the public gaze. Like his birth into the world, it takes place in the quiet and in the dead of night. Perhaps those first visitors to the empty tomb did not quite know what they were looking for. To find the resurrection they had to search for it. The resurrection is not an event that can be witnessed at second hand. When they had seen their risen Lord, they could not convince their friends. They must go themselves and look.

And if we are prepared to look and to search, we will discover so much more. When we witness so much suffering in the world, it can be difficult to know where to look for the signs of hope, just as the women at the tomb did not know what they would find. The light in the darkness will be revealed to us by God if we search for it. The crowd may not notice. Our friends may take some persuading. But when we open ourselves up to God, in the midst of confusion, pain and loss, we will meet the Risen Jesus.
