The year was 1976. We were living in Alveston and looking for somewhere to keep our ponies. We were also looking for a family home to accommodate our family of six. My mother, Win Peirce, had moved to Thornbury and she wanted to buy a field to walk in. So when two fields in Littleton came up for sale we all went to the auction and she bought them! Shortly afterwards Central Farm came up for sale and we all moved there, very close to the meadows. My mother moved into Rose Cottage, next door.

Our family, including the extended family, enjoyed using the fields in various ways' and the ponies were very happy there too! We didn't use fertiliser or weed-killers and gradually we began to notice all manner of wild flowers emerging and increasing year by year. There were primroses, violets, celandines and cowslips in the Spring, followed by bluebells and red campion in the wooded area at the top.

Then, about fifteen years ago we were strolling up the top field when we came across a bee orchid. We were very excited and have seen bee orchids every year since, sometimes one or two sometimes up to twenty. At the same time we began to see pyramidal and spotted orchids and many other wild flowers, insects and butterflies.


Win always loved the fields and for as long as she could she walked up there every day with her dogs. We put a bench at the top and all enjoyed sitting there and gazing at the view over the Severn.

When Win died, in 2007 at the age of 95 we realised that we would have to sell the fields as part of her estate. We were very anxious that they should be maintained as 'unimproved grassland,' by now quite a rarity. We were thrilled to be able to negotiate the sale to South Gloucestershire Council as a Local Nature Reserve.

Now that it is up and running we are even more delighted at the way it is being protected and used. In the Summer of 2011 all the pupils of Olveston School had a wonderful 'Safari' day out there. Win Peirce had been a primary school teacher and had run cub packs all her life. She loved the outdoors, camp fires, fun and games and I know that she would be so happy that her legacy is being used in this way.

July

A very mixed month with sunshine interspersed with showers caused by a procession of low pressure systems passing over us. Being cloudy much of the time, the daytime temperatures were below expected at this time of year, but night time temperatures remained fairly high.

A windy cool month with average temperature approximately 1° C below norm which was also reflected in lower barometric pressure, but with rainfall very close to average.

August

A succession of low pressure systems moving to the North of the British Isles brought many cold and warm fronts over us resulting in almost continuous cloud cover and significant amounts of rain. Cool conditions continued for almost the entire month. Average temperature was almost 1° C below norm, sunshine levels were about 70% of normal and rainfall was approximately half an inch above average..

September

Cool showery conditions existed for the greater part of the month due to Atlantic low pressure systems (many the remains of hurricanes which developed in the Caribbean) bringing their associated weather fronts over the country. For the last four days of the month a huge high pressure system developed over the near-Continent and pushed its way across the south of the country bringing five hot and sunny days.

Average temperature and pressure were marginally below norm but rainfall was slightly above average. We had gales on three days in the month.

The familiar parables, the noble teaching of the Sermon on the Mount in the language of the King James' Version, are still valued as part of our heritage. 

GLOSSFM is back on air!

Community radio station GLOSSFM is back on air from October 31 until November 27 with its annual winter broadcast.

'We've got a month of great programmes lined up,' said scheduler Chris Mountain. 'You can listen to them by tuning in on 87.7FM, or by logging on to www.glossfm.org. Details of all the programmes are on the website.

Over the coming months I will be submitting the 'Parish Matters' article for Meeting Point, and hope to be as erudite as my predecessor, Andy Clarke who has recently resigned as a Parish Councillor. Andy is always very adept at getting things done, has been a sterling advocate and supporter of parish activities over a number of years and will be sadly missed by his fellow councillors.

Andy's resignation does however create a vacancy on the Parish Council, and an ideal opportunity for someone to get involved in local affairs. The democratic process involves firstly offering the Parish the opportunity to call an election, and then from the last week of October inviting local parishioners to either stand for election or alternatively offer to be co-opted onto the Parish Council – please watch the Parish Notice boards for the exact timetable and certainly contact the Parish Clerk and other Councillors if you are interested. Ideally candidates should be on the electoral role of the Parish, although nominations can be accepted from anyone over eighteen who lives within three miles of the Parish.

The September meeting of the Parish Council was dominated by discussions about renewable energy, in particular the increasing number of applications for people wanting to fit solar panels to their houses, and especially the proposed wind farm at Ingst. Fitting solar panels to an existing roof are a good source of energy without taking up potentially useful land – they are however subject to planning permission if in a Conservation area, and advice should always be sought from South Gloucestershire Council's planning department.

Whilst England needs alternative sources of energy, and the parish could indirectly benefit from the associated grants and subsidies, the proposed wind farm at Ingst is naturally a very controversial issue. Parishioners local to this Green Belt site have already expressed concerns over the closeness to their properties, the scale of the turbines themselves (over 2½ times the height of existing pylons in the area), the potential noise levels and especially access for the construction traffic along the narrow lanes around Ingst. A planning application has been submitted for a 15m mast to test wind conditions in the area with a full planning application for the project due early in 2012. The parish council are taking a keen interest in events and would appreciate your written comments to the email address below or to the Clerk.

2012 certainly looks set to be a busy year, with the Olympics and especially the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. A group of parishioners led by Nikki Clark and Sharon Lapworth are already planning some stunning celebrations but would I am sure welcome more contributions.

October is also one of the bi-annual Duke of Edinburgh presentations at St James Palace, and this month Matthew Rogers and James Sawyer are making the trip to receive their awards from Prince Phillip. This year Endeavour Explorer Scouts have achieved a further two bronze, three silvers and three golds, and continuing thanks should go to Kathy & Russell Cook and others who guide young people through this worthy scheme.

Wind Turbines

Residents of Olveston are becoming aware of a proposal to build a wind farm on agricultural land between the M4 and the M48, south of Ingst Hill. Three huge turbines are proposed for this development on Green Belt land, each to be 80m tall with 47m blades giving a full height of 127m. By way of comparison the network of electricity pylons that cross the area are just 50m high, and Ingst Hill is just 27m high. The turbines at Avonmouth are of a comparable size, however sit in an appropriate industrial context.

Most of Olveston will be within 2000m of the site, and if you can see the pylons you can estimate for yourself how the turbines will dominate the landscape.

The homes on the south side of Ingst Hill are 600m from the turbines; householders are not happy about the prospect and view the industrial scale of the proposal as wholly inappropriate to the area and for the Green Belt. There is also very real concern about the ability of the single track lane through Ingst to Northwick to support the construction traffic, and the disruption to local businesses. Police Report

Due to annual leave and commitments we were unable to publish reports for August and September so this report will cover crimes and incidents from that period of time.

At the beginning of August a dwelling burglary occurred in Hill, Berkeley and at the time of writing this report fingerprints found at the scene are still being checked for comparison.

There were 6 burglaries to sheds and outbuildings, two males were arrested and have appeared before North Avon Magistrates Court. All other offences took place during the month of August.

Three push bikes found in Oldbury-on-Severn were traced to an address in Thornbury and three males have been arrested and are currently going through the criminal justice procedure.

Two vehicles have been stolen, a Landrover from a farm in Ingst during the day and a work van from Oldbury-on-Severn during the evening. Both vehicles are still outstanding.

We have had reports of tools and a wheelbarrow stolen from the allotments in Olveston. If you use the allotments, please be vigilant and put tools and items away securely.

Two reports of criminal damage, in one of which unknown offenders threw a brick at the shop door and window breaking the outer pane, fortunately not gaining entry to the premises. In Elberton close to the B4461, an Almond tree (which is quite rare) has been deliberately damaged by the branches being pulled back and snapped.

Shifts have been changed and the Neighbourhood Policing Team will be working between 4pm and midnight on Halloween and will also be working in Thornbury on bonfire night.

Schooling in Olveston Parish, 1836-1968

Headmaster William Green and pupils in 1900



Olveston C.E.V.C. Primary School is a big part of many local people's lives. It's a thriving and successful school, with a lively curriculum and a caring ethos. But what was schooling like in the past – in the twentieth and the nineteenth centuries?

We're in for a special treat when Eric Garrett reveals what he has discovered about the history of schooling in the parish of Olveston, using documentary sources such as school log books and the Victorian school management committee minutes.

He starts his story in 1836 when a new school, Olveston and Elberton National School, was built in Elberton Road, to serve the children of what were then the parishes of Olveston and Elberton. His talk will contain fascinating glimpses of school life in very different times from the present, when schooling was often interrupted by serious illnesses and by absence to help with agriculture. We shall also hear about the Old Down Infants School, whose caring teachers were often praised by school inspectors.

Eric will tell us about different head teachers, all men until the arrival of Doris MacDonald in 1953, and the latter part of his talk is bound to include names of staff – and maybe even pupils - who will be familiar to many local residents. His new book, which is being launched at this event, contains many photos of class groups, which should provide hours of fun spotting familiar faces!

Until the 1830s, Olveston Parish looked after its own poor but, following the New Poor Law of 1834, parishes had to unite in Unions with a central workhouse. Olveston was one of 21 parishes in Thornbury Union. Tony has been researching the history of the Thornbury Workhouse for a new book and has some hair-raising tales to tell.

Wed. 1st Feb. 2012

"Bristol Ships and Shipping in the 15th Century". Tim Bowly retired from British Aerospace Dynamics in 2002, since when he has completed an MA and a PhD on the subject of his talk. He will tell us about medieval ships and their merchandise, the ports they used, navigation, ships of war, piracy, exploration and some of the men who financed and sailed in the ships.

Wed. 7th March 2012

Prof. Tom James has advised Melvyn Bragg and Bettany Hughes on the Black Death and contributed to Radio 4's 'This Scepter'd Isle'. He will give us an illustrated talk on "The Greatest Catastrophe in Recorded History: The Black Death of 1348-50" which, according to modern scholarship, killed over 50% of the population of Europe. His wide-ranging talk will include the impacts of the plague on art and architecture, on the economy and on the mentality of the people of the time.

Wed. 4th April 2012

John Loosley, an energetic and lively local historian, will be telling us about his researches into "Childhood Employment in Gloucestershire". He has looked into child workers in the Forest of Dean and the textile mills of Stroud.

Olveston Church Lands

Remarkably few people in Olveston know much about Olveston Church Lands. Where are these lands? Actually they were sold in the 1920s, and the money reinvested in various Charitable Funds.

What do they do? Olveston Church Lands are a Charity, and their sole purpose is to look after the existing fabric of St Mary's, Olveston. There is a good reason why Olveston Church Lands are not well known. In the 1950s they spent most of their money on repairing the Church roof. Since then they have kept a low profile whilst they replenish their Funds. In the future if there is a major appeal for work on the existing structure, they may be able to help the PCC in a meaningful way.

Over the last few years, small contributions have been made to the PCC to help with maintenance work. They did not make a contribution to the recent Reordering, except in respect of a small amount for work relating to existing fabric.

Loosely, Olveston Church Lands can be described as a private National Trust for the benefit of St Mary's. They are non-religious, and are entirely separate from the PCC. Yours Faithfully

Is your glass half full or half empty?

Which picture do you find most attractive?

'It is a crisp, autumn morning. Dog owners pull on stout boots, warm jackets and wind scarves round their necks and set out for the first walk of the day. A few leaves fall gently, swirling to the ground in red, brown and yellow patterns until they land and the walkers feel and hear their crispness under foot. Arms swing; legs stride out and tails wave and wag in greeting.'

'It is a November morning. The summer warmth is becoming a memory and dog owners no longer leave their homes in T shirts and trainers for the first walk of the day. Instead they are muffled up against the chill. Already the trees are bare and the falling leaves will soon be trodden into the ground where they will become wet mulch under foot. Heads down and hands stuffed in pockets people and their dogs resign themselves to face the winter months.'

Have you ever been asked if you are someone whose glass is half full or half empty or, to put it another way, if you are an optimist or a pessimist. In reality, most of us are somewhere in between. At the beginning of November we know that there will be beautiful Autumn days to enjoy but it would be unrealistic not to recognize that there will also be wet and gloomy days too.

As we begin to face the winter months Olveston and Tockington Methodist Church has already embarked on a refurbishment of Olveston chapel and hall. After all the discussions relating to our property we have decided to do what we can with the limited resources available to us. We have removed the pews from the chapel and having the hall and chapel painted white throughout and the floor sanded and sealed. We have been offered lightweight, upholstered chairs that are no longer needed by Wesley College and expect to reopen both hall and chapel for our carol service on 11th December (although our official opening will be on New Year's Day at 6 pm).

Which picture do you find most attractive?

'The Methodist Chapel is light, bright and welcoming. Chairs can be moved easily to be placed in a semi-circle or round tables. The chapel can be used for meetings, concerts, as well as a place where mums can gather for coffee after taking children to school or retired people can come to play scrabble or sit and chat over tea in the afternoon.

Now the chapel can be used in many different ways.' God is present wherever people gather together and encourage each other.

'The Methodist Chapel is being spoilt. A Victorian building in the village should have been preserved as a period piece! I hardly ever went into it but churches should be treated as churches and shouldn't be opened up for all kinds of activities. Noisy children shouldn't be allowed to play in a church. It should be kept solely for the purpose of worshipping God. After all it is sacred space!'

As the nights draw in and the weather gets colder I wonder if we can find a balance between the attitudes of 'half full' and 'half empty'. When Christians think of Jesus, they see someone who was prepared to challenge the establishment, who opened his heart to people of all kinds, as we hope to open the doors of Olveston Chapel, and he welcomed them unreservedly. He was also realistic. He challenged closed minds and attitudes and showed people a different way of living. He also knew that God was not confined to the sanctuary in the temple but was found helping, encouraging and enjoying the company of all kinds of people.

We hope you will all come to see our newly refurbished chapel in our open week beginning on Sunday 11th December. Watch out for the list of events that will be displayed in the church porch. I will look forward to hearing your comments then.
