

Mon 4 Nov at 7.30pm: In a small German town in 1919, a young woman regularly visits the grave of her fiancé who was killed in WW1. One day she spies a mysterious Frenchman also laying flowers at the grave. As she gradually gets closer to the handsome and melancholy young man, she learns of the deep friendship he had with her fiancé. The film is a thoughtful probing of the aftermath of war through the memories and relationships of loved ones left behind. *German and French with English subtitles.* (2010, 1h 53m, Cert 12)

Mon 18 Nov at 7.30pm: Follow the wonderful tale of an octogenarian lady as she embarks on the adventure of a lifetime to rekindle childhood memories that have been clouded over by the fear of growing old. Through an unlikely friendship with a young local guide, she learns just how strong and resilient she can be, and in doing so, proves to herself and everyone else that it's never too late. All the films are shown in St Mary's Church, Olveston and doors open 30 minutes before the start. Refreshments are available at all the shows, plus licensed bar in the evenings and popcorn and soft drinks at any morning films.

A Solution that is as Simple as Trees

Sometimes, when there is so much that needs to be done to deal with the climate emergency and biodiversity loss, it can be a little overwhelming. As an individual it is also hard to know how you can help to 'do your bit'. It turns out that one of the most effective solutions to dealing with both of these challenges is low tech, low budget and actually quite nice. It's trees. Trees are the ultimate multi-taskers, they absorb carbon, fight flooding, reduce pollution, nurture wildlife and make landscapes more resilient.

As a nation we have been given a target of planting 1.5 billion trees by 2050 to help deal with climate change. That's a lot of trees in just 30 years. This winter, our community can make a start by getting involved in South Gloucestershire Council's winter tree planting programme. In conjunction with The Woodland Trust, the Council is giving away 1,000 free trees of various species – oak, birch, field maple, crab apple, hazel, hawthorn, wild cherry, rowan, holly and goat willow. They will be quite small, 30 - 60 cm whips, but this means they should establish more easily and grow well. Olveston Parish Council is hoping to get 10 trees for the Parish. The Making Space for Wildlife group will be selecting locations to plant the trees in the coming weeks and planting them as part of National Tree Week 23rd November to 1st December. As ever, if you would like to be involved with the project, including planting some of these trees or becoming a 'tree warden' to help look after the saplings in the all-important first few years after planting, please get in touch with Melinda Evans on *melinda rackham@yahoo.co.uk*.

If you can't help with tree planting this time but would like to help with the 1.5 billion tree target, The Woodland Trust is asking individuals to Pledge to Plant and plant a tree on National Tree Charter Day on 30 November (or thereabouts). Amanda Seevaratnam

Amanda lived with her family in Dunstable, Bedfordshire, until she was eighteen. Her first job, at the age of five, was cleaning out the water buckets on a goat farm, where her brother mucked out and her sister milked the goats. Her early life was very much outdoors, living in a small hamlet two miles from the nearest town, with a mother who lectured on living off the land and herbalism.

At eighteen Amanda went to Bournemouth University for an HND in Business Studies. Meanwhile her family had moved back to Chipping Sodbury where her parents had got married and her brother and sister had been born. Amanda remembers travelling between University

and home in her mother's bright orange Robin Reliant known as 'The Carrot' - perfect student transport!

Amanda's mother and sister had opened a wedding shop called Champagne and Confetti, which provided holiday jobs and then a full-time job after University, until Amanda decided to spread her wings. She went to Tenerife to sell time shares (she stresses she was not on the streets but back in the office). However, it was not her scene, so she gave it up and worked in a restaurant. This led to her working with the same family when they opened a local 'pub'; she both managed it and worked there as a singer.

When her mother became very ill, Amanda came home. She worked in the shop, but her heart remained in the pub trade, so she worked at the Railway Inn in Yate for eighteen months and started a Whitbread training scheme to become a landlady. She was then unlucky enough to have a car accident and unable to continue at the pub, so she opened a delicatessen shop in Chipping Sodbury called the Sodbury Pantry, which has changed hands a few times but is still there.

A friend was applying to the Civil Service, so Amanda showed her how fill in the form and by accident both forms were posted. Amanda was accepted, her friend wasn't, and on the day she was offered a job, someone walked into the shop with an offer to buy it. The coincidence was too great to ignore. The job was with the Benefits Agency in Fishponds, but as she missed the bar work, she worked 7am -3pm in the Agency and 7pm to closing time (often around 2am) as a barmaid at the Bell in Chipping Sodbury.

Still being single, Amanda handed in her notice in order to go on holiday to Egypt. When she came home, she took on several temporary jobs and as Chairman of Young Rotary, (called Retroact), she volunteered at the Fairford Air Show where she met some young cadets who were looking for a female leader for a visit to Canada, Amanda was asked and accepted.

By now Amanda was working as Facilities Manager for MBDA, where she met her husband Peter. A year later she moved to BAE Systems on the Aircraft Carrier programme. In 2003 she and Peter got married and they made their home in Peter's house in Laxton Close. In 2006 their daughter Emily was born and they have since moved to Orchard Rise. Emily went to Olveston School and Amanda, who admits she is a 'joiner', was on FOOS (Friends of Olveston School) for five years, acting variously as Chairman, Vice Chairman and Treasurer. When Emily changed schools, Amanda left FOOS and joined Olveston Parish Twinning Association (OPTA), hosting families from Bréhan but only managing one visit to France so far.

Spinal surgery in 2015 led to Amanda having a few months off work; during this time she became reliant on family and friends in the village to recover, reinforcing the importance and joy of having such a caring local network of friends to help.

Daughter Emily is horse mad and has her own horse stabled at Old Down, which keeps Amanda busy. Emily has also been a Rainbow, Brownie and Guide so Amanda always tried to help out those groups too. Amanda loves living in Olveston for the sense of community it offers to those that want it and appreciates being part of such a vibrant and caring village.

St. Mary's Summer Street Fayre

By 2pm all was in place - the sun was now really hot - and there were literally hundreds of people on the Green, more than we have ever seen in any of our previous Fayres.

Congratulations to all the children who took part in the Fancy Dress Parade and to this year's Harvest Queen, Grace Marr, and her attendants Amelia Rowell and Charlotte Oates. Our thanks also to Mr Eric Garrett for opening the Fayre and telling us some of the history of the Green. A Fayre has been held here for 620 years when in 1281 a licence was granted to hold a Fayre twice a year, in May and December. We were entertained by the Bristol Morris Men; the local Zumba Dance group and the Brownies, who gave us a brilliant dance at the end.

Many, many thanks to all of you who helped make this Fayre our most successful yet, not just the money raised - £2,800 - but the wonderful community spirit that came when hundreds of local people joined together to enjoy a Harvest Fayre on their historic Village Green. It even made the front page of The Thornbury Gazette!

Remembering Whistling Jimmy Fowler

On Remembrance Day in November we remember the men and women who have been killed in wars through the years. Hopefully also giving thanks for those who returned home safely once peace was restored. It is fitting that we always remember our service personnel in this way, but there is a large group of war victims rarely recalled. St Georges Chapel in Westminster Abbey, London, houses a book of remembrance which records the names of over 67,000 Second World War civilian war dead. One of them, a beloved local, lost his life in Olveston on the 15th of June 1941.

Cyril John Bowkett's early life is a slight mystery. We believe he was born on the 24th August 1922 and a person with this name had his birth registered then in the town of Worcester. Local memories associate him with Thornbury, but this was many years later. What we do know is that he was orphaned and in the 1930s came to Olveston to live with George and Emma Fowler in their family home, Rose Cottage, on The Common. It seems that the family took to Cyril from their first meeting. Whilst officially keeping his birth name of Bowkett, the family crowned his special nature by giving him the Fowler surname and a family name of James. This was accepted locally and he soon became affectionately known as Jimmy Fowler.

George Fowler, a Wiltshire man, was a carter and farm labourer who found work locally and had married Olveston girl, Emma Curthoys, in 1861. Settling in the village their family grew steadily in number. The 1911 census records that they had had seven children, two of which had sadly died. After George and Emma's deaths the family was headed by an unmarried daughter, Margaret. The 1939 census shows that she was still the head of the family, caring for an Ernest and James Fowler. Ernest, a widower, worked in the tobacco industry, James, Jimmy, was single and worked as an 'office boy at the aeroplane factory'.

The Parish Hall in Tockington has been used for local dances since it opened in 1901. Bands of various sizes perched on the stage and played the tunes for local people of all ages to dance to. No refreshments were provided, however an interval at about 9.30pm allowed a respite for tired feet. For those who wished it a short journey to The Swan Public House provided the opportunity of a 'swift half', no more, and then to return to the hall at 10.00 pm when the pub closed. Dancing continued until just before midnight - before Sunday began -when no revelry was respectable and these dances were above all respectable. The hall emptied, a few groups formed to bid farewells, trysts were made, and hearts fluttered away into the dark night.

Jimmy was a regular at these dances. There is no record as to his dance floor abilities, but he appreciated music and was famous for his harmonious skilful whistling. At 18 years of age he was a bright strong boy with prospects who was admired by quite a few local girls. The dance on Saturday 14th June 1941 was as enjoyable and melodious as ever. The final musical rendition of the night may have drowned out the air raid siren which, although sounded in Thornbury, could clearly be heard in Tockington. The message that a raid was on was quickly passed around the dispersing groups. Raid warnings were frequent and did not overly concern many, but the drill was to get home or into cover as soon as possible. Jimmy chose to return home and within a few minutes he was below St. Mary's at the junction of Ley Lane and Church Hill.

Overhead a German aircraft, its crew bent on destruction, had either missed its target at Filton or Avonmouth and was heading home. As was normal it jettisoned its bomb load to add speed to its flight. A rack of twelve bombs was released, the first of which came to earth by Port Farm. The lethal falls continued in an arc behind Hill House and onto the side of Olveston Court. The last bomb landed in the field alongside the horse pond close to where Jimmy was walking. He must have heard the plane and bomb explosions coming in his general direction, but perhaps never heard the last one which took his life. He died instantly. Villagers who attended him included the local police officer Constable Gregory, but there was nothing which could be done for Jimmy.



Jimmy was buried with care in St. Mary's churchyard on 19th June 1941 after a solemn service led by the Reverend Thomas Ridgwell-Barker. Parish records show that Jimmy is documented under his official birth name. His funeral service was well attended, Fowler family tears were shed. Many who had danced with him or appreciated his whistling prowess brought precious memories. Work colleagues from The Bristol

Aircraft Corporation felt his loss and a special irreplaceable gap in their ranks.

Jimmy lies at peace in an unmarked grave to the north side of the churchyard extension, a short distance from where he lost his life. In summer his grave is garlanded with wildflowers. He was the only World War Two civilian death within the Parish. Cyril, or Jimmy, will forever be remembered in Westminster Abbey, but I feel is deserving of remembrance locally as well.

Elizabeth Blackwell of Bristol, First Female Doctor

Almondsbury Patient Participation Group Clive Wiltshire

Patients of Almondsbury Surgery will probably be aware that there is a Patient Participation Group (PPG) which has been set up to form a regular link between the patients and the clinical services of the practice. Members meet with the practice management and doctors every quarter to discuss any issues highlighted by patients for discussion or action within the practice where appropriate.

The surgery has recently been approved by Severn Deanery as a training practice. This means that there will be rotating trainee doctors being supervised in GP training. These trainees are fully qualified doctors at various stages of their postgraduate training; some are doing their foundation level training prior to specialising, others are GP trainees. Training is deemed an important aspect of the work of the practice and all trainees are carefully supervised by the regular GP staff. Patients should be asked if they are happy to see a trainee and are welcome to decline if they wish. The PPG welcomes this development and sees it as a vital function to increase the GP staffing in the NHS.

Recent visitors to the practice may have noticed extensive building works over the last few months. These are nearing completion and amongst other improvements the practice will soon be opening a Minor Surgery Suite. Full details will be released shortly.
