

From the Editor

In the end it was a warm and sunny summer. If you are the sort who likes to reflect on this kind of thing, you may enjoy reading about a year in the life of Pat Thirkettle's favourite viburnum. Due to a historical quirk, (our house was extended around it), a shrub called *Viburnum tomentosum* var. *mariesii* sits in gravel surrounded on two sides by windows. It is highly visible from several places including walking up the stairs and looking out from the bedroom. It stands six feet tall and nearly twice as wide

In winter it is a pleasing shape of spreading branches which are regularly visited by blue tits pecking something interesting from its branches. This Viburnum is the first plant in the garden to show green with breaking leaf buds, usually at the end of February, but dependent of course on the severity of the winter. In fact this year 2013 was a record, the first green showed on January 11th, but it struggled from then on until late April!





By April/May it comes into its glorious best, covered from head to foot in large lace cap heads of white flowers. Each one is up to four inches across, with individual flowers clustered tightly at the centre, surrounded by a loose fringe of more flowers. In a wet year these can last nearly a month.

In summer it sits quietly green while other shrubs take centre stage, but always at the end

of July it is the first to show red at the tips of the leaves. This is not particularly welcome as it means the year is already turning towards winter.

However, from then on the red leaves spread downwards and by September/October the shrub is a picture. Some of its leaves are still green,

mixing with the bright red and purple, and it usually has a small second flowering, each one a miniature of the spring flowers but standing out brightly against the red. The leaves remain until the end of November by which time they are purple, and slowly drop, forming a colourful carpet over the gravel to reveal the bare bones again. There are now only three months of providing sustenance for blue tits before it all starts again.

Free Forest Taster Session

At Stepping Stones in Elberton we are very lucky to have woods in the grounds and are able to offer forest sessions. Forest and woodland areas are well known for helping children gain knowledge and understanding of the natural environment, improving their self-confidence and developing all areas of the curriculum.

Our weekly Woodland Wednesday sessions provide children with an opportunity to do just this. Safety is an important issue and children are taught the rules before entering the woods. All the staff have had forest skills training. Once in the woods, the children have ample opportunities for free play, exploring and climbing. Structured activities are also offered. A child who may be reluctant to partake in a maths activity in a classroom setting will often quite happily measure and count sticks he/she has collected in the woods. Songs, stories and group activities are held in our base camp.

One aspect of the Parish Council's duties is to consider planning applications that local residents make to South Glos Council. These include applications to prune or remove trees, especially in the Conservation Areas. Whilst this is often necessary, the numbers are exacerbated by those that have been planted too close to walls, buildings etc and are now causing problems.

At this time of year when planning new plantings, it is worth thinking about the type and size of tree being considered and, given the potential life of trees, the long term consequences of the positions in which they are being planted. Similarly, regular planned pruning and maintenance will ensure their continued well being at a manageable size, since not all trees can survive major surgery!

Keeping our footpaths clear

With autumn tidying soon to begin, may I make a plea to anyone whose garden abuts the pavement to please cut back their plants.

In a village like ours with pavements which are already narrow, overhanging bushes are a real problem to pedestrians. No one wants to be responsible for driving walkers onto the road by letting their plants get in the way.

Cook's Calendar: October

When I was a child I used to love reading the Brambly Hedge books about mice living in an oak tree. I particularly enjoyed the story of how they gathered the fruit of the hedgerow to stash in the store stump to guard against the harsh winter

ahead. Doubtless the mice would probably have appreciated a 24 hour Tesco, but the sense of storing the autumn abundance for the coming months has stayed with me and I love to pick blackberries, sloes, damsons and elderberries.

Our pear tree is groaning with harvest and the falling fruit is a serious danger to the chickens below. Every so often a fruit will drop, narrowly missing a hen, which will run squawking from the unexpected and rather hazardous snack.

This recipe uses blackberries and almonds, making for a truly autumnal feast. A financier is a type of French cake using a batter made with egg whites, not hard to make and useful to use up a surfeit of egg whites. You can either serve it at tea time or for a pudding, served with poached pears.

Blackberry and almond financiers

40g plain flour

1/4 teaspoon baking powder
120g icing sugar plus extra for dusting
45g ground almonds
4 egg whites
65g butter
175g blackberries

Preheat the oven to 170C, grease well a 12 cup cake tin, or if you prefer, line with paper cases.

Melt the butter in a pan and continue to heat until the butter turns a golden brown. Keep a close eye on it as there is a fine line between brown and burnt. Pour through a sieve into a bowl and put to one side.

Sift the flour, icing sugar and baking powder into another bowl and add the ground almonds. Add the egg white and whisk vigorously for a minute, then pour the melted butter into the mixture and continue to whisk until combined.

Pour into the prepared tin, filling each 2/3 full. Add the blackberries to the top of the batter and cook, checking after 12 minutes but they may need up to 18 to achieve a beautiful golden colour on top.

Stand for a minute or two then run a knife around the outside of each cake to ease their turning out. If you still have trouble turning them out, a silicone spatula will help.

Cool, dust with icing sugar and enjoy your autumnal treat.

Flower arranging

Following the success of St Mary's Flower Festival in July one wonders how many of you were inspired to find out more about flower arranging? The displays, ranging from a variety of traditional massed flower arrangements through to quirky carpet, cup cake and flowerless ones, show how versatile and varied the art of flower arranging is. Created by both the experienced and inexperienced, many of whom had never taken part in a flower festival before, everyone worked together to produce a truly memorable event.

Whether you prefer simply to watch someone else doing it or you would enjoy a more hands on approach, there are several local groups which cater for those with an interest in flower arranging.

Thornbury has two Flower Clubs which are always keen to welcome visitors and new members. Generally holding two meetings a month, along with other less regular social events and outings such as coffee mornings, teas, garden/flower festival visits, the main one consists of members watching a NAFAS (National Association of Flower Arranging Societies) qualified demonstrator who does five or six arrangements on stage and talks about them as s/he does them. Male or female, these demonstrators are varied in subject matter, personality, humour and style of presentation; no two demonstrations are ever the same and never cease to entertain, educate or inspire.

The secondary meeting is an informal social practice class when members have a chance to get 'hands on' and create a pre-agreed style of arrangement under the watchful eye of an experienced flower arranger who will guide the creative process and give praise and constructive criticism as necessary. Both have dates of their monthly meetings included in the Meeting Point diary.

Thornbury & District Flower Club meets on the second Thursday of the month at the Methodist Hall at 7.30pm and holds its practice classes there at the same time on the fourth one. More details from 01454 417865.

Severn Vale Flower Club meets on the third Wednesday of the month at the Armstrong Hall at 2pm and holds its practice classes there at 1.30pm on the last Tuesday of the month. More details from 01454 885213.


