We met for our Annual Dinner on 13<sup>th</sup> August at The Italian Kitchen at The Alveston House Hotel. A very enjoyable evening was had by all, good food, good company and lots of gossip.

Angela Green, a member of the W.I., gave an interesting and thought-provoking talk on Feminism at the September meeting. She quoted historical references, going back as far as Pythagoras, to demonstrate men's view of the role of women in times gone by. We were taken through the thoughts of Mary Wollstonecraft in the 1790s, the suffragette activism and organisation of Emmeline Pankhurst in the 1900s which helped women to win the right to vote in 1918. The two World Wars changed the role of women in society and the cause was further promoted by Simone de Beauvoir in 1947. The work of Margaret Sanger and Marie Stopes to introduce methods of birth control and the production, after many years of research, of the birth control pill in 1960 changed many women's lives, as did the Abortion Act of 1967 and the Equal Pay Act of 1975. # Our Villages Need Your Help!

In recent years the local community has expressed concern at the increased volume and speed of traffic through our villages. There has been a marked

increase in the volume of through traffic since the removal of the toll charges on the Severn Bridge, many of which are large commercial vehicles that contravene the speed and weight restrictions that apply around the area. This all has a serious impact on the safety of our villagers, but particularly on children and older people, and it is felt that now is the time for action to be taken. Other concerns raised include anti-social street parking, signage, lighting and traffic calming measures.

Olveston Parish Council is supportive of action being taken and information is currently being gathered from various sources including traffic monitoring and will be compiled into a report to be presented to South Gloucestershire Council soon. It is most important that the views of the community are represented and would ask for your comments on the following:

- 1. The installation of traffic-calming measures especially the option of a 20mph limit throughout the villages;
- 2. Any issues you may have with parking that affect you personally;
- Any other traffic/parking related issues about which you have concerns.

# Bullets and Fishy Legends of the River Severn

Looking at the River Severn near Aust today, it is difficult to imagine open waters and no sign of any bridges crossing the area. A first road crossing had been suggested by Thomas Telford in 1824, but it took until 1961 for the construction of the first bridge to begin. At the outbreak of World War Two the only way for the public to cross over the river was the Aust to Beachley Ferry.

In early 1939 the Air Ministry established several practice firing ranges in the country, one being in our local area. The breadth of the River Severn offshore from Aust and the observation that this opened up further downstream was ideal for RAF planes to use for practice shooting. Plans were produced which plotted ranges radiating from a distinctive chimney serving a steam powered pump house, south of New Passage, near the entrance of the Severn Tunnel. For different types of guns several triangular ranges, A to D, were marked on maps to accommodate different calibres of weapons. The furthest of these extended almost to Denny Island off Avonmouth.

Connected to the river range was the established land-based firing range at Redwick. The whole area was protected by four flagstaffs and look-out huts. When firing took place, red flags were hoisted and, when safety returned, these were taken down. Service personnel in the huts watched over the area and suitable warning notices were posted. On the water, warning buoys marked out danger areas. The whole scheme was ably managed by HMS



Flying Fox, the headquarters of which were in Bristol.

Perhaps the most obvious alarm for local people was the noise of aircraft, flying down the Severn, firing a variety of guns. Several calibres of machine guns, Bofors, Oerlikons, the powerful Hispanos and a few unnamed

devices cloaked in secrecy, poured fire into the river. Some of these were aimed at a fixed target near the Black Badwins rocks, offshore of Chittening chimney - another local landmark. Sometimes a drogue target, a kite like device on a long rope pulled by a plane, was fired at from the air or at ground level. At Redwick, twelve pounder field guns let loose at this and the

innocently named 'Pillar Box', fired rockets which could reach as high as 10,000 feet before exploding. The Redwick range was protected by sand and soil butts into which bullets could be spent and, in one area, steel plates guarded the end of the range. It was accepted however that stray projectiles could overshoot these into the Severn.

As well as 'friendly fire' the area was bombed several times by the Luftwaffe trying to destroy the Severn railway tunnel. The highly regarded 'Smiley' Ken Neale of Tockington can remember sheltering under a tree at Pool Corner and seeing a German aircraft pass by. It was so slow and low that the pilots face was clearly visible. Fortunately, the raids did not succeed, as the bombing was well spread and inaccurate. It did provide shoreline bomb craters used as low tide bathing pools by local families.

Whilst the spectacle of military might was impressive, it did not please everyone. The salmon fishing rights belonged to retired Lieutenant Commander Frank Howard Pratt of Darts Cottage, Pilning. The local salmon pool extended from Severn Beach to New Passage. Lave nets and other fishing devices caught the prized fish. Due to the ranges however, letters to the Air Ministry pointed out a loss of fishing time and unexploded devices in the area being a real danger and compensation for loss of earnings was requested. Copious reports at our National Archives detail serious Government considerations. The Air Ministry had indemnified the range for, loss, damage or injury to property or persons', but no mention was made of fish. Matters were eventually ended by an official pointing out that the activity on the Severn was clearly in 'Defence of the Realm', for which there was no provision for compensation.

There were compensations perhaps unknown to The Ministry, for local people, who soon realised that explosions in the water produced an unintended gift of fish. Salmon and other delicious fish that had been caught in the firing, floated to the surface and many came ashore. They provide a welcomed addition to wartime rationing. Any mention of Severn fishing at this time must recall Sidney Wilkins, the grandfather of 'Smiley' Ken. He became legendary for his skill at catching conger eels which he cut up and distributed locally, as they were not rationed. On one occasion he was seen cycling home, with dormant large eels draped over his shoulders. They were remembered as being so big that the head and tail both nearly touched the road. His undoubted skill with eels did not depend on explosives, although he may also have benefited from that fishy bounty.

The end of the war saw some sort of normality return to the Severn. The Severn Ferry no longer risked an accidental strafing from on high. Fishing resumed, although stocks were found to be depleted. It was claimed – but never proven - that this was due to the firing ranges. The local villages appreciated peace after six long years of war and so, I am sure, did the fishy inhabitants of the River Severn.

# Excavations at Lower Hazel

Olveston Parish Historical Society. Wednesday 2nd October 7.30 pm. Olveston Methodist Church

After the Norman Conquest, land in Alveston was claimed as Royal Forest.



This was land reserved by the King for hunting, and subject to special laws administered by special officers.

Forest was valued by the King because it supported wild beasts for hunting. Harsh forest legislation, often resented by the King's subjects, protected these beasts from unauthorised hunting and from any action which discouraged their breeding.

Lower Hazel is in Olveston Parish, bordering the parish of Alveston. In the first talk of our new season, Roger Howell will give us an update on Excavations at Lower Hazel and will explain how the excavations link to the Royal Forest of Alveston. In his beautifully illustrated talk, he will explain the nature of the site and the kind of work he and others have been carrying out there. The talk will be very up-to-the-minute, as Roger will be incorporating their latest findings.

There will be a brief AGM before the talk. Tea, coffee and biscuits will be served. Everyone's welcome to this talk... just turn up.

Toads Trevor Cook

It had rained heavily and the courtyard at the back of my house began to flood because the water was not running down the drain. The water had reached my doorstep when it thankfully stopped; something definitely had to be done. I tried flushing water down the drain but to no avail, and then I hit on the idea of running the hosepipe down into the drain to move the blockage along.



Imagine my shock as the hose pipe went down the drain and an enormous toad came up the other way! To this day I have no idea how it got there; was it a recent invader or had it lived down there for years living on the insects and worms that inevitably fall into the drain?

It was a Common toad, as opposed to the rarer Natterjack toad, and could be

identified by being browner and wartier than a frog. In addition, their hind legs are shorter than those of a frog and their toes are not webbed either. And that's because it prefers to live further away from water and so they crawl rather than jump like a frog,

As for 'my' toad- I put it in a nearby garden pond which, given their less

aquatic life, was not a brilliant idea. The owners of the pond were not overly impressed either, being convinced that their frog tadpoles would be gobbled up. Unfortunately, I couldn't deny their dietary predilections as toads apparently eat almost anything that moves, including grubs, spiders, worms, insects, slugs, snails and other invertebrates



Anyway, we never saw 'my' toad again and can only hope it found a toady love and will help to engender many more little toads in the coming spring. Look out for strings of toad spawn (as shown in the picture above) in your ponds, which are quite different to the usual clumps of frogspawn.

Look at the birds of the air they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?" Mat 6v25-26 NIV
